Critical Issues Facing Student Affairs in the State University System As Reported by Vice Presidents for Student Affairs September 2003

University student affairs vice presidents were asked to identify their top issues for student affairs. Below is a combined list of concerns:

Funding

- Removing the existing caps on student Activity & Service fees.
- Clarifying and streamlining the process and timetable for the distribution of Capital Improvement Trust Fund dollars.
- Adequate general revenue funding (funding to support services for an increasing and diversified student population).
- An appropriate funding formula that recognizes each university's individual mission and its unique characteristics.
- Enhanced funding for ADA-related services.
- Enhanced funding for safety and security issues.
- Resources to improve the uses of technology in delivering programs and services.
- Financing the increasing costs of higher education (from a student perspective).
- Resources to facilitate student wellness.
- Resources to facilitate expansion of bridges from community colleges.
- Financial resources for retention programs, mentoring, and tutoring.

Facilities

- Facilities for career needs (career preparation in an increasingly tight economy and labor market).
- Facilities and resources for the growing number of students with mental health needs.
- Facilities and resources for complying with federal mandates (e.g., Student and Exchange Visitor Information System).
- Expanded childcare resources.
- Expansion in residence halls and other needed student centers.
- Adequate parking facilities.
- Adequate class spaces to meet rising enrollment numbers.

Other Issues

- Student health (including mental health) and continuing case management in college.
- Infusion of character values.
- Potential from alcohol and other drug abuse leading to undesirable outcomes for the person and others.
- Student diversity adapting programs and services to a student population that is changing in ethnicity and socio-economic background, and is growing older.
