Thank you for the feedback on the proposal for the Ph.D. in Behavioral and Community Sciences (CIP 51.2212). Our response to each item is summarized below.

#### **BOG Response**

A discrepancy was noted between the narrative that describes the fellowships, scholarships, and graduate assistantships to be allocated to the proposed program through year 5 (page 63) and Appendix A Table 2, Projected Costs and Funding Sources. According to the narrative, the program has planned for a total of \$315,000 in contract and grant (C & G) funding to support new doctoral students. Appendix A Table 2 shows \$105,000 for assistantships and fellowships being funded with enrollment and general (E & G) funds for year one and shows \$105,000 for assistantships and fellowships being funded with E & G funds and \$105,000 being funded with C & G funds for year five. Please clarify the source and the amount of funding to support the fellowships, scholarships, and assistantships. If Appendix A Table 2 is edited, Table 2 on page one of the proposal will need to be corrected.

• Table 2 changed to include the cumulative amount of Contract and Grant (C&G) funding required for graduate assistantships in Year 5. We had included only one year of C&G funding (\$105,000) for Year 5 rather than the cumulative amount required (\$315,000). In addition to the change in Table 2, we also adjusted the table on page one of the proposal and the corresponding narrative on page 63. These changes are highlighted in yellow to facilitate your review (please see attached document).

#### **BOG** Response

The proposal describes the program as a response to the "crisis in staffing" by producing Ph.D.s who will prepare undergraduate and master's level students for jobs in the behavioral healthcare field. The behavioral healthcare field is broad in scope. What will a graduate be expected to teach at the postsecondary level?

• As stated in your memo, behavioral healthcare is broad in scope and faculty will be prepared to teach classes in a variety of disciplines as well as interdisciplinary programs. We have prepared a list of courses (see list below) that graduates of the Ph.D. program will be prepared to teach, depending on their area of specialization. The list was developed, in large part, on courses listed in the SCNS. It is organized into fourteen areas including: Mental Health; Substance Abuse and Co-Occurring Disorders; Abuse and Violence; Human Services; Health and Behavior; Child and Adolescent Behavioral Health; Behavioral Health and Older Adults; Behavioral Health and the Criminal Justice System; Behavioral Health Systems; Behavioral Health and the Family; Positive Behavior Support; Developmental Disabilities; Human Development; and Behavioral Science Research. These areas cover the broad array of potential areas of study and courses doctoral students will be prepared to teach upon graduation.

#### INTRODUCTION

- I. Program Description and Relationship to System-Level Goals
- A. # a) Level: Ph.D. Research Doctoral Degree

The Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences is an interdisciplinary program focusing on research and policy in the area of behavioral health and community sciences. Behavioral and Community Sciences refers to the development and evaluation of services and interventions that promote resiliency and social well-being for at-risk populations and addresses these issues within the context of community settings.

Behavioral health disorders such as mental illness, substance abuse, behavioral and developmental disorders require the integration of services across medical settings, treatment facilities, and community services. Integrated approaches to treatment and recovery are essential at every stage of the process. Integrated medical and behavioral healthcare programs build on a variety of community behavioral support systems and evidence-based practices to address the wide range of issues associated with mental illness, substance abuse, and behavioral disorders. "Treatment and recovery efforts don't just depend on an individual, but on the community as a whole" (SAMHSA Director Kana Enomoto, 2015). The Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will prepare graduates to conduct research to address the complex, challenging problems associated with behavioral health disorders. As is described later in this proposal, the USF College of Behavioral & Community Sciences is uniquely positioned to offer this degree given its history with the Florida Mental Health Institute, faculty expertise, high level of grant and contract funding, and research infrastructure.

#### b) Specializations

The program will offer students opportunities to specialize but these areas will be developed on an individual basis based on student research interests and career goals. Examples of specialties include: Substance Abuse and Co-Occurring Disorders; Community Based Behavioral Health Systems and Services; Child and Adolescent Behavioral Health; Behavioral Health, Law, and the Justice System; Disability & Rehabilitation Studies; Behavioral Health Disparities; and Positive Behavior Intervention & Support.

#### c) Total number of credit hours

The program will require 90 graduate hours. Students will complete 15 hours of doctoral core courses, 18 hours of research/statistics courses, 18 hours of behavioral health content courses as well as 9 hours of courses within a behavioral health specialty area, and 30 hours of directed research/dissertation. The program builds on existing courses offered within the College of Behavioral & Community Sciences as well as other academic units within the University. Only four new courses are required to establish this new program. The program is designed so that students can complete the degree within a four-year timeframe.

#### d) Overall purpose

The purpose of this program is to prepare individuals to conduct research addressing behavioral health challenges (e.g., mental illness, substance use disorders, co-occurring disorders, developmental delays and disabilities, and behavior disorders) and socio-cultural challenges (e.g., poverty, disparities, homelessness) with the goal of improving community services through early intervention, integrated care, policy and system change, and positive behavioral interventions and support.

Behavioral health challenges are extremely complex and inherently require research from many areas of science. As a result, interdisciplinary research is a necessity rather than an option when dealing with complex human conditions (National Institutes of Health, 2005). Interdisciplinary research is "a mode of research by teams or individuals that integrates information, data, techniques, tools, perspectives, concepts and/or theories from two or more disciplines or specialized bodies of knowledge to advance fundamental understanding or to solve problems whose solutions are beyond the scope of a single discipline or area of research practice" (National Science Foundation, 2004). The purpose of the proposed program is therefore:

- To prepare students to conduct interdisciplinary research and to apply the outcomes of research to the improvement of behavioral health systems and community services;
- To respond to the "crisis in staffing" within behavioral health care in Florida by producing Ph.D. s who will prepare undergraduate and master's level students for jobs in the behavioral healthcare field;
- To address important societal needs that are among the major health care challenges facing the State of Florida and the United States as a whole, i.e., mental health, substance abuse, and developmental disorders;
- To implement a doctoral program that contributes to the SUS goals for excellence in teaching, research, and community engagement, and research productivity;
- To prepare researchers who can apply new knowledge to increase community workforce productivity and reduce costs associated with employee absenteeism and lost productivity due to mental health and substance use disorders;
- To implement a model for doctoral training that minimizes the need for additional resources. As noted by the external consultant, the business case for the proposed degree is remarkably efficient.
- e. Examples of Career Opportunities: This program will prepare researchers, academicians and policymakers in research design, evidence-based practices, program evaluation, policy analysis, and systems change in the area of behavioral and community sciences. Graduates will be prepared to enter: (1) teaching and research positions as faculty members in colleges and universities, (2) behavioral health research positions and evaluation specialists in local, state, and federal agencies, and (3) grant specialist positions at private, non-profit research organizations.

# Questions from CAVP Review Group

1. Please clarify the relationship between the market demand and the degree level. The demand described [in the pre-proposal] does not seem to reflect research Ph.D. education. Also, what types of positions will the graduates be moving toward.

The pre-proposal provided data on the need for entry-level employees in behavioral healthcare. The proposed program will not prepare entry-level practitioners but will prepare the faculty who will teach the entry-level practitioners in university settings as well as conduct research in behavioral health. Because of the inter-relationship between the need for entry-level practitioners and the need for faculty who will prepare students for these jobs, this proposal includes market demand data for both levels of employment.

Research Ph.D. Market Data: The Ph.D. program will prepare individuals to assume positions as faculty members in universities or to assume positions as researchers in organizations that have a research mission such as federal agencies, state agencies, and private agencies. Employment of postsecondary faculty with a doctoral or professional degree is expected to increase 16.9%, particularly in health specialty areas where there is an expected employment increase of 36.1% (U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2013).

A review of position announcements for faculty in the *Chronicle of Higher Education* (August – October, 2015) provides evidence of the market demand for graduates of the proposed Ph.D. program. In this three-month time period alone, numerous advertisements for faculty positions were found that were related to the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences: 24 behavioral health research positions; 22 social and behavioral science positions; and over 50 positions in human services, public policy, and closely related educational fields (see section II A for specific job titles).

There is also a market for Ph.D. graduates outside of university settings. The need for health researchers who engage in clinical investigation, research and development, and require a doctorate or a professional degree, is expected to increase by 36.4% (U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2012). Further, the need for operations research analysts and statisticians who use advanced analytical methods to investigate complex organizational issues, identify and solve problems, and improve decision making is expected to increase by 27% (O\*net, 2015). Graduates of the proposed Ph.D. program will be prepared to fill the need for these positions in behavioral health.

Entry Level Practitioner Market Data: The health and social assistance sector had the largest increase in employment (37%) in 2012. This sector is projected to grow at an annual rate of 2.6%, adding 5.0 million jobs between 2012 and 2022 (Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2013). This

accounts for nearly one-third of the total projected increase in jobs. University faculty will be needed to train the individuals who will be seeking these jobs. The proposed Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will produce individuals who will prepare undergraduate and master's level students for jobs in the health and social assistance sector.

Within Florida, the need for trained behavioral healthcare employees was highlighted in a recent series of articles in the *Tampa Bay Times* (October-November, 2015). The series described a number of factors that are affecting patient and employee safety in Florida's mental health hospitals, including staff shortages and the lack of staff with sufficient training in behavioral health. Although staffing shortages are due in part to the limited funding to hire an adequate number of employees, there is a clear need for individuals who are highly trained and knowledgeable about effective practices. After studying the status of behavioral healthcare in Florida, the Vice Chair of the House Children, Families, and Seniors Subcommittee concluded that Florida has a "crisis of staffing" in behavioral healthcare. The proposed Ph.D. program will address this problem by producing doctoral level graduates who will prepare students to work in behavioral healthcare and who will conduct research to enhance the quality of care in behavioral health services.

2. Please clarify if the program will focus on life-span issues or aging. Some CAVP members thought that the program was going to focus on aging.

Behavioral disorders and certain anxiety disorders often emerge during childhood while most of the high prevalence disorders (anxiety, depression, and substance abuse) emerge during adolescence and early adulthood. The onset of psychosis is typically between the ages of 16 and 30 with a median age of 19. Therefore, the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will focus on behavioral health issues across the lifespan with an emphasis on child, adolescent, and adults. Specific areas of study include: child and adolescent behavioral health; adult mental health; substance abuse; the co-occurring disorders of mental health and substance use; recovery oriented behavioral healthcare; behavioral health disparities among specific populations; community based behavioral health systems and services; and the interaction of behavioral health disorders and the criminal justice system. Hence, this program will have a life-span focus with an emphasis on the study of effective service systems.

Dr. Joseph P. Morrissey is a Professor in Health Policy & Management and Senior Faculty Fellow, Cecil G. Sheps Center for Health Services Research, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Dr. Morrissey has worked in the mental health services research field at the federal, state, and local levels for the past forty years. His research and publications have focused on mental health services from systems, inter-organizational, and organizational perspectives; outcomes for persons with serious mental illnesses; managed behavioral healthcare; state mental hospital deinstitutionalization trends; the interface of criminal justice and mental health programs;

services for homeless mentally ill persons; and the history of mental health policy in the United States. He served as Director of the UNC/Duke Post-Doctoral Research Training Program in Mental Health Services & Systems for 25 years. Prior to his current position at UNC-CH (1987-present), he was a principal research scientist for the New York State Office of Mental Health (1978-87), and held teaching positions at SUNY-Albany (1978-87) and Brandeis University (1975-78), and served as staff sociologist in the Office of Biometry at National Institute of Mental Health (1968-75). He received the Carl A. Taube Award for career contributions to the mental health services research field and the Steve Banks Mentoring Award, both from the American Public Health Association.

The complete report is included as Appendix D. Highlights from the report follow:

- The Ph.D. degree in Behavioral Health & Community Sciences responds to important societal needs that will intensify with growing populations in the years ahead. The needs that this program will address—mental health, substance abuse, and developmental disorders—are among the major health care challenges facing the State of Florida and the United States as a whole. The burden of conditions on individuals, families, the economy and our society is high. Current expenditures on individuals with these problems make up a growing proportion of federal, state, and local budgets. More evidence-based information is needed about what works, for whom and under what circumstances so that tax dollars can be targeted to truly helpful interventions and away from the many costly services now provided that do not work. Investigators with high-level research skills and an interdisciplinary understanding of these problems—such as those who will emerge from this Ph.D. program—will be needed to support responsible public policies and programs in the years ahead.
- The business case for the proposed Ph.D. degree is remarkably efficient. No new faculty are needed, as faculty within the College will meet all of the teaching and advising requirements. Further, only four new courses are planned. A single Ph.D. degree for the College (with subspecializations) is much more reasonable and efficient than individual Ph.D. degrees for each Department. The size (N= 7) of entering cohorts is also reasonable and affords the program an opportunity to evaluate whether market demands might call for expanded cohorts in future years.
- The structure and curriculum is well thought out in ways that will equip its graduates with the high-level research skills needed to pursue research careers. The result will be students with highly marketable job skills to secure positions in academe, public agencies, and community research settings. Graduates from the proposed Ph.D. degree will have the skills and knowledge to secure positions in academic, governmental, and private research organizations.
- The program is designed to prepare students to conduct interdisciplinary research and to apply the outcomes of research to the improvement of behavioral health systems and community services. Policies and practices now emphasize integration and coordination of services across mental health, substance abuse, disability, and related domains. Efforts to design, implement, and assess the effectiveness of these efforts on growing populations of

individuals with behavioral and related needs increasingly require the type of interdisciplinary-trained investigators that this program will produce.

• The proposed degree program will be supported by an outstanding group of faculty who together have the expertise and experience required to offer doctoral-level education. As a group, they have an impressive record of external grant funding from federal, state, and local sources as well as private foundations. The variety, amounts, and durations of funded research will provide opportunities for Ph.D. students to engage in hands-on research under faculty supervision will likely provide stipends to support Ph.D. students as research assistants during their 2<sup>nd</sup> through 4<sup>th</sup> years.

The feedback from Dr. Morrissey was used to enhance the proposal at various stages of the proposal writing and review process. His review influenced the review process as follows:

- The narrative describing the characteristics of the program was expanded to demonstrate how the interdisciplinary conceptual design of the program would be operationalized.
- A chart was added to reflect the history of the College in obtaining external funding to support graduate assistantships and to demonstrate the capacity of the faculty to generate additional funds to support new doctoral students.
- The section on partnerships was expanded to demonstrate the strong collaborations that currently exist with community service providers and state agencies and how these will provide opportunities for community-based research for students.
- A plan was developed to promote the inclusion of additional funds for doctoral students in grant and contract proposals by faculty in the participating departments.

# Teaching & Learning in an Area of Strategic Emphasis

The Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences is fully aligned with and supports the State University System Planning Goals. The program will have a direct impact on the quality and reputation of the SUS by increasing the number of degrees awarded in an area of strategic emphasis: behavioral aspects of health. After the program is fully operational, seven students will graduate each year who will be prepared to conduct research designed to enhance the behavioral health service delivery systems in Florida.

#### Scholarship and Research

The new Ph.D. program will have a **direct impact** on the SUS goals for research and scholarship. USF is uniquely qualified to offer this program because it has been the home of the Florida Mental Health Institute (FMHI) for over 40 years. FMHI has a state-mandated mission to conduct research and evaluation to improve the behavioral health of Florida's residents, families, and communities. The new Ph.D. program will significantly expand research and scholarly activity related to the behavioral health of our state and local communities. In turn, these research accomplishments will contribute to improving the behavioral health of our nation.

The departments involved in this program have a strong base of external funding to support their research. In the past five years (2010 – 2014), the faculty have received over \$100 million in new external contract and grants. The research productivity of these departments will be augmented by the addition of doctoral students who can contribute to and expand upon the work of their faculty mentors. The proposed program will contribute to the research capacity of USF and to the State by preparing future generations of researchers who can address critical issues in behavioral health. Their ability to develop, test, and disseminate evidence-based practices will help to ensure that state resources are invested wisely in high quality services that produce cost-effective outcomes.

#### **Community Engagement**

The new program will have a **direct impact** on USF's opportunity to engage with community partners. One of the hallmarks of the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences is its emphasis on community-based participatory research. Much of the research conducted by faculty and

students in this program will be developed in partnership with community agencies and organizations at the state and local levels and will address critical community needs in behavioral health. As a result, the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will contribute to the quality of university-community partnerships and will strengthen USF's designation as a Carnegie Community-Engaged University.

The proposed program also has an **indirect impact** on the strategic priority to increase the community and business workforce. Mental illness, including substance abuse, often manifests itself in the workplace through employee performance issues such as absenteeism or reduced productivity. "Mental illness causes more days of work loss and work impairment than chronic health conditions such as diabetes, asthma, arthritis, back pain, hypertension, and heart disease" (Research Works, 2009). In 2011, the estimated lost earnings resulting from behavioral health issues in Florida was \$26.1 billion (Shern, 2012). The Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will directly address these critical issues by preparing researchers who can apply new knowledge to increase worker productivity and reduce costs associated with employee absenteeism and productivity, disability, and health care coverage. Furthermore, the Ph.D. program will prepare researchers who can apply new knowledge to increase worker's motivation and productivity by enhancing resilience and preventing social, behavioral, and emotional disorders.

#### Area of Programmatic Strategic Emphasis and Justification

The proposed program is relevant to the strategic emphasis on health with a focus on behavioral aspects of health. According to the World Health Organization, mental health disorders (including substance abuse) rank as the largest health problem in North America in terms of disease burden (i.e., the combined effect of premature death and the number of years lived with a disability). These conditions add significant cost to the provision of healthcare in the United States. The evidence is overwhelming. A report in Health Affairs (Mark et al., 2011) indicated that the United States spent \$113 billion in mental healthcare, about 5.6% of all national health care spending.

From 2007 to 2011, the rates of emergency department visits with a principal diagnosis related to mental health, alcohol, or substance abuse worsened overall for both males and females (AHRQ,

2015). The U.S. Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (2010) reported that over 12.5% (12 million) of emergency room visits by adults were for a mental illness and/or substance use problem. This is 1 in 8 visits. Almost 41% of those 12 million visits resulted in the patient being admitted to the hospital which is more than 2.5 times the rate of hospitalization for other medical conditions. Over 60% of emergency room physicians reported that the high incidence of emergency room visits by individuals with behavioral health disorders has a negative impact on access to emergency medical care for all patients—causing longer wait times, increased patient frustration, and diminished capacity of hospital staff (National Health Policy Forum, 2007). This problem is not limited to adults. Mental illness affects more young people than all other chronic diseases. Each year, approximately 157,000 youth between the ages of 10 and 24 receive medical care for self-inflicted injuries at emergency departments across the U.S. (CDC, 2015).

Substance abuse has reached epidemic levels in the United States. Deaths by overdose have more than doubled in the past 15 years. There are now more deaths resulting from overdose than from car crashes in the U.S. and one-third of fatal car crashes involve a driver under the influence of alcohol and/or other drugs (National Council for Behavioral Health, 2015).

Starting in 1996, Congress enacted several laws designed to improve access to mental health and substance use disorder services. The Mental Health Parity Act of 1996 (MHPA) required the addition of mental health disorders under health insurance or benefit plans; the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act (MHPAE) extended the MHPA requirements to substance use disorder benefits in addition to mental health benefits. The Affordable Care Act expanded the application of MHPAE to Medicaid benefits. As of 2014, most individual and small group health insurance plans, including plans sold on the Marketplace, are required to cover behavioral health services. Thus, more people will now have the ability to obtain services for a mental health or substance use disorder and the need for expanded and enhanced community based services is projected to increase.

#### Behavioral Health Need in Florida

In Florida, nearly 2.5 million adults need mental health services and 1.1 million are in need of assistance due to a substance use disorder. Florida has the 7<sup>th</sup> highest percentage of adults (16.87%) with mental illness, the 7<sup>th</sup> highest percentage of adults with serious thoughts of suicide (3.6%), and the 9<sup>th</sup> highest percentage (7.7%) of adults in the country who are dependent on or abuse illicit drugs or alcohol (Mental Health America, 2015). The number of Florida residents admitted for an involuntary and emergency psychiatric exam (Baker Act) has increased dramatically in recent years. The number of involuntary exams (Baker Act) increased 81.89% from 2002 to 2014 (181,471 individuals in 2014). Among children and youth in Florida, 9.1% have emotional, behavioral, or developmental issues. Approximately 6% of Florida's youth are known to be dependent on or to abuse illicit drugs or alcohol.

More than 136,000 children in Florida who needed services in 2012 did not receive mental health services. Unfortunately, Florida ranks among the lowest states (47<sup>th</sup>) in the country in providing services to adults with a mental illness (Mental Health America, 2015). This is striking given the amount of funding Florida provides for services. The Department of Children and Families budget includes over \$1 billion for mental health and substance abuse programs in Florida. This includes funding for Community Mental Health Services, Community Substance Abuse Services, the Sexual Predator Program, the Forensic Commitment Program, and the Civil Commitment Program. (Department of Children and Families/Office of Budget Services, 2015). These allocations do not

include the expenditures by Medicaid which is a major source of funding for mental health services in Florida.

In an effort to improve care and lower costs of behavioral health services, Florida became one of the first states to offer a Medicaid health plan designed exclusively for people with serious mental illnesses such as schizophrenia, major depression, and bipolar disorder. Nearly 20 years ago, the Agency for Health Care Administration (AHCA: Florida's Medicaid authority) implemented a mental health carve-out as an option for individuals with mental health problems. However, this approach raised concerns associated with the lack of coordination that existed from Medicaid recipients receiving physical health services from one set of providers and mental health services from a different set of providers. Substance abuse services were provided by yet a different set of providers. During 2014, AHCA implemented the Florida Managed Medical Assistance (MMA) program that includes a specialty plan specifically designed for both adults and children with severe mental illness/emotional problems. This specialty plan is required to provide a comprehensive array of physical, mental health, substance abuse, dental, and pharmacy services to enrollees. The goal of this plan was to build on the positive aspects of the Prepaid Mental Health Plans by improving the coordination of physical and mental health care (and other services) for those enrolled in Medicaid.

The expansion of insurance benefits for individuals with behavioral health conditions is expected to increase the workforce demand in Florida as well as increase the need for research. In a presentation on the efficacy of Florida's Publically Funded Mental Health Services (Shern, 2012), the President of Mental Health America indicated that a rigorous course of analyses should be conducted to demonstrate the potential impact and savings of behavioral health programs and to reduce the negative impact on individuals, communities, and state agencies, including the criminal justice system. The Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will prepare graduates who will be capable of conducting the complex analyses needed to achieve this goal and to contribute to the knowledge base in Florida regarding evidence-based practices and effective policies to mental illness and substance use services.

Although the proposed program will not prepare bachelor-level graduates, it will produce the faculty who will teach those students and prepare them for entry-level positions. Therefore occupational data and salary data are provided for the entry-level baccalaureate jobs as well as for doctoral level graduates. First, we provide predictions for behavioral health at the national level (all levels) followed

by predictions for academicians and researchers in behavioral health at the doctoral level.

# <u>Predictions for Behavioral Health Occupations: National BLS Data</u>

Employment predictions in social service, social science, education, and behavioral health occupations are among the highest growth sectors in the U.S. (Bureau of Labor Statistics, U.S. Department of Labor, 2014). This growth is driven by a number of factors including: increasing numbers of individuals with disabilities; changes in the insurance industry (e.g., the Affordable Care Act); the growing number of veterans, military personnel, and the families of veterans affected by behavioral health issues; and the increased emphasis on quality assurance, risk management, comparative-effectiveness research and accountability within publicly supported programs.

The health and social assistance sector had the largest increase in employment (37%) in 2012. This sector is projected to grow at an annual rate of 2.6%, adding 5.0 million jobs between 2012 and 2022 (Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2013). This accounts for nearly one-third of the total projected increase in jobs. University faculty will be needed to train the individuals who will be seeking these jobs. The proposed Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will produce individuals who will prepare undergraduate and master's level students for jobs in the health and social assistance sector.

Salary data were obtained by examining bachelor's degrees awarded nationally in human services programs; this number does not include degrees in Social Work (The Center on Education and the Workforce http://cew.georgetown.edu/). Of the 64,606 graduates in human services, 94% were employed following graduation with 88% employed full-time. The median salary for these entry-level positions was \$38,000 (\$27,000 at the 25th percentile and \$53,000 at the 75th percentile). Twenty seven percent of the graduates were reported to proceed to graduate school

The National Council for Community Behavioral Health conducts a salary survey of behavioral healthcare providers on an annual basis. The median salary of bachelor-level employees ranged from \$29,200 to \$41,000. Both the lowest and highest salaries were in programs housed within hospital settings. Outside of hospital settings, the highest salaries were in entities operated by state or local governments (median salary of \$39,500) with the lowest median salaries in private not-for-profit organizations (\$32,500).

#### Predictions for Behavioral Health Occupations In Florida: FETPIP

In Florida, approximately 90% of the workforce in behavioral healthcare service agencies require a baccalaureate degree. The CIP code for the undergraduate program most closely aligned with behavioral healthcare is 44.0000 (Human Services). USF offers the only B.S. in Behavioral Healthcare in Florida and this program was established in 2012. Hence, only 5 graduates are reflected in the 2012-13 FETPIP database but all 5 were either employed full time (75%) or continuing their education (25%). Subsequent graduates of the program have continued to obtain employment (typically immediately following their field experience placement) and/or have entered graduate programs. To supplement the data available in FETPIP, key informant interviews were conducted with not-for-profit behavioral healthcare agencies in Florida. The following themes emerged:

1. The ratio of bachelor's level to master and/or doctoral staff is high. Typically, agencies reported employing only one or two clinical staff. The remaining staff are bachelor-level employees. Hence there is a high need for behavioral healthcare employees at the baccalaureate level.

- 2. Bachelor's level staff provide assistance with services that are not delivered via the traditional office visits used in the private psychotherapy model, i.e., the services are provided during home visits, at drop-in centers, in residential programs, or day treatment programs.
- 3. Agencies are hiring bachelor-level employees even with the budget constraints limiting the number of new positions. Nearly every agency interviewed had 1 to 4 bachelor-level positions open at the time of the interviews. One agency reported they had 27 positions available for bachelor-level employees.

The need for trained behavioral healthcare employees in Florida was highlighted in a recent series of articles in the Tampa Bay Times (October-November, 2015). The series described a number of factors which affected patient and employee safety, including staff shortages and lack of staff with sufficient training in behavioral health. "Since 2009, violent attacks at the state's six largest hospitals have doubled. Nearly 1,000 patients ordered to the hospitals for close supervision managed to injure themselves or someone else... Staffing shortages are so acute that violent patients wander the halls unsupervised. Employees are left alone to oversee 15 or more [persons with mental illness]... Staffing shortages are now so acute that employees say they sometimes can't take bathroom breaks, much less control the patients in their care." The article made the argument that severe staff shortages and lack of appropriate training increased the risk to both patient and employee. Although the staffing shortages are due to the lack of funding available to hire and adequate number of employees, there is a clear need for individuals who are highly trained and knowledgeable about effective practices. A member of the Florida legislature, Representative Kathleen Peters who is the Vice Chair of the House Children, Families, and Seniors Subcommittee, concluded that Florida has "to ensure staffing is adequate, but that being said, we have a significant problem with workforce shortages." After studying the status of the mental health services in Florida, both in hospitals and in community agencies, she indicated that Florida has a "crisis of staffing" in behavioral healthcare.

# National Predictions for Researchers and Academicians in Behavioral Health: BLS

In addition to preparing undergraduate students for entry-level employment, graduates of the doctoral program will be trained to conduct research to provide the "evidence-based information needed about what works, for whom and under what circumstances so that tax dollars can be targeted to truly helpful interventions and away from the many costly services now provided that do not work. Investigators with high-level research skills and an interdisciplinary understanding of these problems—such as those who will emerge from this Ph.D. program—will be needed to support responsible public policies and service program administration in the years ahead" (Dr. Joseph Morrissey, external consultant for this proposal).

Employment of postsecondary faculty with a doctoral or professional degree is expected to increase 16.9%, particularly in health specialty areas where there is an expected employment increase of 36.1% (U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2013). The need for health researchers who engage in clinical investigation, research and development and require a doctorate or a professional degree, is expected to increase by 36.4% (U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2012). Further, the need for operations research analysts and statisticians who use advanced analytical methods to investigate complex organizational issues, identify and solve problems, and improve decision making is expected to increase by 27% (O\*net, 2015). When these data are combined with the fact that Illicit drug use,

major depressive disorders, and suicide risk are among the high-priority evidence gaps for preventative health services (U.S. Preventive Services Task Force), the market for behavioral health researchers is expected to be high. The proposed program will prepare individuals to conduct this research to bridge the evidence gap.

A review of faculty position announcements in the *Chronicle of Higher Education* (August – October, 2015) provides ample evidence that graduates of the program will have job opportunities. This search identified advertisements for numerous higher education positions related to the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences: 22 in social and behavioral science; over 50 in human services, public policy, and selected educational fields; and 24 in behavioral health research positions. Examples include:

- Research Scientist in Community or Systems Change
- Assistant Professor in Human Services
- Assistant Professor in Child & Family Studies
- Assistant Professor in Child & Adolescent Studies
- Assistant/Associate Professor in Child Development and Family Studies
- Assistant Professor in Families, Health, and Policy
- Assistant Professor of Gender-Based Violence
- Tenure-track position in Gender-Based Violence and Quantitative Analysis
- Core Faculty in Community Mental Health
- Assistant Professor in Clinical, Health, and Behavioral Health
- Faculty position, Center on Children, Family & the Law
- Assistant Scientist, Behavioral Science and Health Services Research
- Assistant/Associate Professor in Health Services Research
- Assistant or Associate Professor in Behavioral Science (health disparities)
- Assistant/Associate Professor in Early Care and Education
- Research Scientist Mental Health Services Evaluation

Employment opportunities are also possible for program graduates to become research scientists (research program/project directors, research and evaluation specialists and grant specialists) at private, non-profit research organizations (such as the Research Triangle Institute, the Rand Corporation, Abt Associates, ICF-MACRO, the Center for Implementation Science and Prevention, the American Institutes for Research (AIR), and the VA Center for Implementation Practice and Research Support. Graduates will also be prepared for jobs in quality improvement divisions and policy divisions of federal and state agencies. Examples include The Center for Disease Control, National Institutes of Health, and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Agency. Similarly, Walter Reed Hospital recently advertised for a mental health services researcher to conduct studies related to the Military Behavioral Healthcare System. Specifically, they described the need for research to increase access to care and to increase the use of Evidence Based Practices for soldiers, their families, and veterans.

# Florida: Researchers and Academicians in Behavioral Health: Other Sources

FETPIP data for the doctoral level was based on a small number of graduates or was not reported. Therefore, other sources of data were identified to provide an estimate of employment opportunities and earnings for graduates of the proposed program.

According to data from the Florida Research and Economic Database Application (FRIEDA) and the May, 2014 BLS State Occupational and Employment and Wage Estimates for Florida (BLS), the projected growth rate for medical scientists (excluding epidemiologists) between 2014 - 2022 is 35% or 2,450 individuals (annual growth 4.4%). Further, 52% of all employment (approximately 1,271 persons) will be in the area of Scientific Research and Development Services. This industry group comprises establishments primarily engaged in conducting original investigation undertaken on a systematic basis to gain new knowledge and to apply research findings or other scientific knowledge for the creation of new of significantly improved products or processes (experimental development), including behavioral and cognitive research and development services. In Hillsborough County alone, it was estimated 2,183 medical scientists were employed in this services area during 2014 (FRIEDA). The mean salary for medical scientists in Florida was estimated at \$81,776 (May, 2014 State Occupational Employment and Wage Estimates: Florida).

Because the proposed Ph.D. program is an interdisciplinary program, graduates may be hired in multiple disciplines. Therefore, salary information is being provided for several related disciplines: The average salary for newly hired Assistant Professors was \$78,000 (42.01 CIP); \$57,500 (44.07 CIP); and \$81,000 (51.22 CIP) (OSU Survey, 2014). The average salary at the Full Professor rank was \$107,128 (44.07 CIP); \$127,078 (42.01 CIP); and \$153,497 (51.2201 CIP).

#### Post Doctoral Fellowships

Graduates of the program will also have opportunities to obtain Post Doctoral Fellowships upon completing the Ph.D. degree. Examples of fellowships recently advertised in the Chronicle of Higher Education include:


Significant demand for this program exists from students with degrees in behavioral healthcare, child & adolescent behavioral health, psychology, mental health/rehabilitation, and related fields. In psychology alone, there were far more qualified applicants than were able to be accepted to doctoral programs. Each year, the American Psychological Association surveys the chairs of graduate psychology departments to determine the number of applications and acceptances (Graduate Study

in Psychology, 2016). For the 2016 survey, 520 departments responded representing 1,688 programs in the United States. The survey covered program admissions during 2013-14. At the doctoral level, the responding institutions received 79,647 applications and accepted 10,564 students (13.3% of all applicants). Acceptance rates in these programs were: Clinical/Research Programs (12%); Social (7%), Counseling (11%); Developmental (14.1%), and Experimental (12.7%). The national pattern holds true in Florida universities as well. For example, the USF Ph.D. clinical psychology program receives approximately 250 applications annually for 7-10 slots; the University of Florida program receives 350 applicants for 12-15 slots. The high selectivity of these programs results in unmet demand by a large pool of applicants who may be interested in a research degree in a closely related field such as behavioral health. Please note that many students who were not admitted to the highly selective doctoral programs are highly qualified for graduate studies and the probability is high that they will be successful in their graduate careers.

#### **Survey of Current USF Students**

During the Spring, 2015, a survey was conducted of approximately 3,000 USF students majoring in social & behavioral science disciplines. Over 300 responses were obtained. The results indicated that 47% plan to go directly to graduate school following graduation and 24% plan to work a few years and then apply to graduate school. Of those who indicated they planned on attending graduate school, 71% (n = 189) indicated they planned to pursue a doctoral degree. Over 85% of the respondents indicated they would definitely (n = 118) or probably (n = 115) be interested in pursuing a Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences at USF (see following chart).


# Survey of Currently Enrolled Students

A similar survey was conducted with alumni who had recently graduated with degrees in behavioral and social science disciplines at USF. Of the 299 responses received, 59% indicated they planned on enrolling in a doctoral program in the future. When asked if they would be interested in pursuing a doctoral program in Behavioral & Community Sciences, 61% said they would definitely (n = 105) or would probably (n = 77) be interested. Respondents were given the option to provide an email address if they would like additional information on the degree; 168 of the respondents provided their email address. The areas of highest research interest by respondents were: mental illness and substance use disorders (53%); child and adolescent behavioral health (49%); positive behavior interventions and support (47%); behavioral health, law, and the justice system (42%); and community-based behavioral health systems/services (41%).

Participants were asked to describe the reason the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences would be of interest to them. Examples of open-ended comments follow:

- I would be interested because it fits my career goals and interests. Plus, USF does not have anything like this program so it will be a good option after I finish my Masters.
- It would further increase my knowledge for my career path in the Department of Corrections.
- I am currently a psychiatric nurse and I encounter mental health and substance abuse disorders on a daily basis. I would be interested in this program.
- I have a master's in Community Psychology and I would be interested in furthering my education in this area.
- Applied research would be beneficial as my current employer is involved in a big push for normalization in the juvenile justice system with positive behavior interventions.
- I worked in the field of child welfare for several years. I became interested in developing programming to improve the system of care and gear it towards a more holistic approach. While I am clear on the type of research I would like to do, I have found no schools in Florida that offer a doctoral program that provides the framework needed.
- The study of behavioral health and criminal activity go hand in hand. I am currently enrolled in a criminal justice master's degree. This program has great appeal to my future educational goals.
- I work in behavioral health and see the disparities that exist. I would be highly interested in pursuing research that promotes mental health within the community.
- I would like to gain a better understanding of community-based behavioral healthcare systems and make positive changes for youth and adolescents, especially those displaced from their families or who have experienced significant trauma.
- I mostly appreciate the concern for the social/economic environment and how that relates to behavioral challenges. I think research is the best way to approach any sort of solution.

- I am interested in health disparities experienced by people with developmental disabilities.
- It seems like a program such as this will integrate other fields which is the direction we need to be heading.
- This program sounds like the perfect fit for where I would want to be n the future.
- I am genuinely interested in the intersection of mental health and policy. This program sounds like it would cater to my professional development. There is a need for more interdisciplinary doctoral programs.
- I am interested in research in behavioral and socio-cultural challenges. The behavioral health system needs improvement and it would be great to be part of positive changes in these areas.
- C. If substantially similar programs (generally at the four-digit CIP Code or 60 percent similar in core courses), either private or public exist in the state, identify the institution(s) and geographic location(s). Summarize the outcome(s) of communication with such programs with regard to the potential impact on their enrollment and opportunities for possible collaboration (instruction and research). The Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will be the only doctoral program in the state in the 51.2212 CIP. However, FIU and FAMU both offer a doctoral program with the four-digit CIP (51.22: Public Health General). A review of the curriculum on the university websites indicated that there is no substantive overlap between the proposed Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences and the programs at either FAMU or FIU. The distinctive focus of the proposed program at USF is on behavioral health, mental health, and substance use disorders among children, adolescents, and adults.

The FAMU Doctor of Public Health (DrPH) degree includes two concentrations: (1) Epidemiology & Biostatistics and (2) Behavioral Science & Health Education. In communications with Provost Marcella David, some courses/content may exist in the proposed program that are offered in the Behavioral Science & Health Education concentration at FAMU (specifically health disparities and maternal and child health). While noting that some duplication may exist in these two areas, Provost David indicated that FAMU saw no negative impact on the enrollment and degree productivity of FAMU's DrPH. FAMU offered "full support of the proposed degree." USF concurs with the FAMU curricular analysis and notes that, even in content areas where course titles appear to overlap, the emphasis on the proposed USF program is distinctively different than the FAMU program because of USF's emphasis on mental health and substance use as related to child and adolescent behavioral health and mental health disparities.

Florida International University offers a Ph.D. in Public Health with specializations in (1) Epidemiology, (2) Environmental and Occupational Health, and (3) Health Promotion and Disease Prevention. Of the three, the third specialization has a closer relationship with our proposed program because health behavior change is covered in the FIU program. However, the emphasis at FIU appears to be on physical disease prevention and wellness rather than a specific focus on behavioral healthcare, mental illness, and substance use disorders. Communications with Provost

Furton indicated that FIU has "no concerns regarding this proposal" and stated that FIU does not see any conflicts with their program (see letter from Provost Furton).

#### Rationale

Seven new students will be admitted each year and enrollment will level out at 28 students by the fourth year. The program is designed for students to complete all degree requirements within four years.

Table 1-B (Appendix A) describes the projected **cumulative** headcount and FTE. For purposes of FTE estimation, it is projected that five students will enroll from preceding degree programs at USF or other Florida public universities and two will enroll as "additional in-state or out-of-state residents." The FTE calculations were based on the number of credit hours students will complete in each year of study multiplied by 7 students and then divided by 32 SCH. These calculations were conducted in a cumulative manner for students entering and completing the program in each of the first four years with enrollment anticipated to remain stable at 28 students in Year 5 and beyond.

#### **Enrollment Shift**

Because this program will admit students directly to doctoral studies, no shift in enrollment is anticipated from other graduate programs at USF.

E. Indicate what steps will be taken to achieve a diverse student body in this program. The proposed Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences is the only doctoral degree in the six-digit CIP code for Behavioral Aspects of Health (51.2212). As described in section IIC of this proposal, the review of the proposal by FAMU indicated that no substantial duplication exists in the proposed program and no negative impact is anticipated on enrollment and degree productivity (FAMU). Likewise, FIU indicated they did not see any conflicts of the proposed program with the FIU programs.

#### Steps to Recruit a Diverse Student Body

Former Surgeon General David Satcher reported in 2001 that minorities in the United States "suffer a disproportionate burden of mental illness" because they often have less access to services than other Americans, receive lower quality care, and are less likely to seek help when distressed (Mental Health: Culture, Race, and Ethnicity, 2001). Unfortunately, this situation

continues in 2015. The National Council on Behavioral Healthcare has emphasized the critical need for the development of research and education to reduce behavioral health disparities (National Council, 2015). Clearly there is a need for additional research, development, and dissemination of evidence-based practices to improve access and the quality of care of minority populations.

The departments involved in the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences (i.e., the Department of Mental Health Law & Policy and the Department of Child & Family Studies) are committed to enrolling students who reflect a diverse student body. This can be documented by the racial and ethnic diversity of students who currently participate in programs offered by these departments. Approximately 43% of students (373 of 864) enrolled in undergraduate or graduate programs in the participating departments are Black, Hispanic, American Indian, or Multiracial. For the past ten years, these departments have conducted summer research programs to increase the number of first generation, under-represented minority students in behavioral health fields. These programs were funded by the National Science Foundation (2003 – 2009) and the National Institute of Mental Health (2010 – 2016). Over 54% of the students in these programs were from groups that are under-represented in the field including 49% minority students, 6% were students with disabilities, and 85% were women.

### **Faculty Diversity**

Doctoral students typically select a program based on the scholarly work and expertise of the faculty members. Students interested in the study of diversity often seek faculty members who are themselves representative of a diverse background. The faculty members in the participating departments include 25% minority faculty members and 66% female faculty members.

#### Diversity in Research

The grants obtained by faculty in these departments reflect an emphasis on diversity. Of the nearly \$20 million in external funding obtained by the faculty in 2014-15, the majority involved diverse and at-risk populations, including projects dealing with mental disabilities, autism and other developmental disabilities, children and youth at risk for disabilities, HIV, homeless populations, and veterans. Many of these projects involved systems in which minority populations are disproportionately-represented and/or areas in which disparities in access to services exist, e.g., child welfare, criminal justice, and behavioral healthcare.

#### Diversity in the Curriculum

Because of the diverse population with behavioral health problems, it is essential that the curriculum address issues of diversity both as an integrated part of all learning experiences as well as through specialized courses related to diversity. Students in the Ph.D. program will have the opportunity to specialize in behavioral health disparities and design and develop strategies to overcome such disparities. Specific courses are devoted to this topic such as: Cultural Competency in Behavioral Health, Social and Cultural Foundations of Rehabilitation, and Women's Mental Health. In addition, courses such as Community Based Participatory Research and Evaluation (CBPRE) include sessions on working with diverse populations.

# Strategies to Recruit a Diverse Population

Specific strategies will be taken to recruit a diverse population of students for the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences. Recruitment activities and outreach will be emphasized with the following institutions/groups:

- Historically Black Colleges and Universities
- Hispanic Serving Institutions
- Tribal Colleges and Universities
- NIMH Summer Research Institutes for Undergraduates who are under-represented in the field
- NSF Research Experience for Undergraduate programs for students who are first-generation or under-represented in the field
- Human service agencies that serve a high proportion of minority populations
- Annual conferences of professional organizations such as the Association of Black Psychologists,
  Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities, National Indian Education Association,
  National Council on Behavioral Healthcare, the American Psychological Association, the
  National Research & Policy Conference on Child, Adolescent, & Young Adult Behavioral Health
  with particular emphasis on divisions that focus on minority/cultural diversity.

#### III. Budget

#### **Faculty Costs**

During Year One, 1.32 Person Years will be devoted to the new program at an estimated cost of \$122,675. This faculty effort will be needed to teach eight courses (all of which are already being taught for other programs in the university), to provide supervision for directed research of first-year students, and to support the doctoral program director. By Year Five, the faculty effort for this program will increase to 3.05 Person Years at an estimated cost of \$352,192. The increased faculty effort increases to 3.05 because of the additional coursework needed to support each cohort as they advance to their second, third, and fourth year of study (see chart below). The curriculum requires 8 courses in the first year of study, 9 courses in the second year of study, and 5 courses in the third year of study plus directed research in each of these years. In the fourth year of study, students will be working on their dissertation. Thus, in Year 1 of the new program, only 8 courses will be offered for the first cohort. With the admission of each additional cohorts, the number of courses will increase as shown in the following table. In addition, faculty will be needed to supervise directed research and dissertation research. Thus, the Person Years increases proportionately from 1.32 in Year 1 to 3.05 in Year 5.

The faculty costs also includes funds for a part-time Program Director at. 10 FTE in each year of the program.

#### **Program Administration**

No new funds are required for program administration. The budget includes support for a part-time staff member to provide clerical and logistical support for the program (\$15,000). However, funding for this part-time position will be obtained through internal reallocation.

#### **Graduate Student Support**

E&G funds are also included for seven graduate assistantships (7 x \$15,000 = \$105,000) in their first year of study during which time they will serve as teaching assistants. Every year, the new entering cohort will be supported on E&G funds for their first year of study. Therefore, the budget reflects \$105,000 of E&G funding for graduate assistantships in Year 5 as this will be a recurring cost but for different cohorts.

Beginning in their second year, students will become research assistants and their stipends will be paid through contract and grant funding. To demonstrate the capacity of the college to hire graduate assistants through contract and grant funding, a three-year history is provided in the following table:

Given this history, it is reasonable to assume that the college will be successful at obtaining additional new contract and grant funding for new graduate students. The departments associated with the proposed doctoral program are those in the College that obtain the largest amount of grant dollars (approximately \$25 million annually--see Section 9E for detail). In the past, these departments have rarely included graduate assistant funding in their budgets because they did not have a doctoral program from which to draw students to assist with their research. Instead, they hired research staff as hourly OPS employees or salaried employees. In anticipation of approval of the doctoral program, the faculty have indicated they will begin to include graduate assistant support in their proposal budgets in future submissions. It is reasonable to assume that grant funding in behavioral health will continue to be available given that Behavioral and Social Science funding has

remained in the top 10 areas of federal funding and mental health in the top 20 areas of federal funding in the past three years even with the difficult economic climate of the recent era.

#### Plan For Doctoral Student Support

After the Ph.D. proposal is approved, workshops will be held with faculty and grant administrators to develop a process for increasing new grant funding to support doctoral students. The departments associated with the doctoral program will implement a process by which all proposals for external funding will be reviewed by the department chair to determine if funds have been requested to support graduate students (when possible and appropriate). Likewise, the Associate Dean for Research (who will also serve as the Director of the Ph.D. program) will review all proposal budgets prior to submission using the "USF Internal Form" to determine if funds for doctoral students have been included in the budget request. Priority for assigning doctoral students will be given to faculty who have or who have the potential to obtain funding to support students during the last three years of their program.

#### **Tuition Basis**

This program will be offered as a traditional tuition-based program. Tuition will be based on the standard graduate level rates at the University of South Florida.

# No Negative Impact

No negative impacts are anticipated on other programs or services by the establishment of the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences. The curriculum has been designed to maximize the use of courses that are already offered at the University. The Deans of each of the units have consulted with their faculty and concur that the addition of students from this program will not create an additional burden on existing courses (Colleges of Arts & Sciences, Education, and Public Health). Letters of concurrence are included in the appendix.

#### Positive Impact

The primary impact on faculty will be the addition of mentorship responsibilities for more doctoral students. However, this responsibility is expected to result in increased research productivity as graduate students mature and take active roles in the research programs of faculty members. Likewise, graduate assistants will become available to help faculty by working as research assistants

and as teaching assistants for undergraduate courses. Hence, the additional responsibility for research mentorship is expected to be offset by the benefits graduate students will bring to the program as well as the support they can provide for teaching and research.

The new program will also have a positive impact on students in undergraduate and graduate programs. The College of Behavioral & Community Sciences offers an undergraduate research certificate that provides students to work with graduate students and faculty in a research mentorship role. The additional doctoral students admitted for the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will provide additional opportunities for undergraduate students to gain research experience.

D. Describe other potential impacts on related programs or departments (e.g., increased need for general education or common prerequisite courses, or increased need for required or elective courses outside of the proposed major).

#### Potential Impact on Related Programs/Departments

As an interdisciplinary program, the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences builds on existing coursework from several graduate programs at USF rather than duplicating coursework. This interdisciplinary approach is essential in order to prepare researchers who will study behavioral and socio-cultural problems. Discussion has occurred with all departments to assess their capacity to add more students to existing courses. Approval has been gained from all units that offer courses included in this proposal (please see letters in the appendix from the School of Aging Studies, College of Public Health, College of Education, and College of Arts & Sciences).

Not only is the sharing of courses an efficient method of offering the proposed doctoral program and the existing doctoral programs, but it also provides students with exposure to the interdisciplinary perspectives, methodologies, knowledge, and skills that are at the heart of the conceptual design of this proposal.

E. Describe what steps have been taken to obtain information regarding resources (financial and in-kind) available outside the institution (businesses, industrial organizations, governmental entities, etc.). The participating programs associated with the proposed Ph.D. have a history of research partnership and funding from local, state, and federal agencies, philanthropic foundations, non-profit agencies, and businesses (see following list). We will be able to build on these long-standing relationships to support the doctoral program through research partnerships and student support. Faculty who work with these agencies will have the opportunity to provide students with research, program evaluation and scholarly experiences relevant to their doctoral studies. In addition, we anticipate that doctoral students will be hired as research assistants to help with contract/grant projects with these agencies.

#### IV. Projected Benefit of the Program to the University, Local Community, and State

#### Benefit to the University

The Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will contribute to USF's Strategic Plan to conduct high-impact research to change lives, improve health, and foster positive societal change (Goal 2). In addition, the program will assist the university in achieving the performance metrics needed to maintain USF's position in the top tier of American research universities (RU/VHR), to maintain its designation as a *Carnegie Community Engaged University*, and to enhance its standing on AAU performance indices. Specifically, when fully implemented and mature, the new doctoral program will add an average of 7 new Ph.D. graduates per year which contributes to USF goals for AAU, Preeminence, Carnegie classification, and USF Tier 1 Performance Metric. Likewise, the program will contribute to USF Goal 2, high quality research, by increasing research expenditures (AAU, Preeminence, and USF Tier 1 Performance Metrics 2.4 and 2.5), number of citations (AAU and USF Tier 1 Performance Metric 2.2), and number of post-doctoral appointees (AAU, Pre-eminence, Carnegie, and USF Tier 1 Performance Metric 2.1) that will develop as the result of increased contract and grant activity.

#### Benefit to the State

The Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will be the only doctoral program in the 51.2212 CIP. As such, the program will prepare individuals for faculty positions in universities within the SUS system, for careers in a variety of behavioral health fields, and for agencies that conduct research to inform public policy decisions at the state level.

The benefits of the Ph.D. program in Behavioral & Community Sciences are substantial in light of the prevalence of mental health disorders, substance abuse and co-existing mental disorders, and co-morbid mental health and chronic illnesses in Florida's residents of all ages and the critical staff shortages describe in previous sections. There is an urgent need to develop new, effective strategies to coordinate physical and behavioral health services, especially for high-risk, high need, and high cost populations and to prepare employees who can address these needs through the application of research and evidence-based practices.

Furthermore, the accomplishments of faculty, students, and community partners in the Ph.D. program will not only lead to the development, evaluation, and implementation of policy and practice options within Florida but will also produce models for dissemination throughout the country where all states are wrestling with health and behavioral health integration challenges.

#### Benefit to the Local Community

The primary benefit to local communities will be the preparation of faculty who can prepare a workforce qualified to provide behavioral healthcare services. However, the community will also benefit from the research conducted by faculty and students in the program. Much of the research conducted in behavioral health will be developed in partnership with community agencies and organizations and will address critical community needs in behavioral health. All students will

complete coursework in Community-Based Participatory Research and Evaluation (CBPRE). The program is therefore expected to have a direct positive impact on the local community.

The Ph.D. program will enable community organizations/agencies/entities to actively participate with faculty and students in the full spectrum of research –from conception, implementation, analysis, interpretations, conclusions, and communication of results. The goal is to influence change in community health systems, programs, and/or policies. Community members and researchers will work as partners, combining knowledge and action for socio-cultural-political changes to improve community health and reduce behavioral health disparities. Community partners and researchers will work together to create models to increase communication as well as the trust and capacity necessary to improve community behavioral health, with the goal of increasing community participation in the ultimate goals of the community. This orientation recognizes the unique contributions of both researchers and community partners in positive change.

#### SUS and USF Mission

The mission of the State University System of Florida is to provide undergraduate, graduate and professional education, research, and public service of the highest quality through a coordinated system of institutions of higher learning, each with its own mission and collectively dedicated to serving the needs of a diverse state and global society. The USF Mission is to deliver competitive undergraduate, graduate, and professional programs, to generate knowledge, foster intellectual development, and ensure student success in a global environment.

# Relationship of Proposed Program to SUS and USF Missions

The proposed doctoral program will contribute to the USF and SUS missions to provide graduate programs of the highest quality as well as to produce research that will generate new knowledge to enhance the quality of life and productivity of individuals with social, emotional, and behavioral challenges. Research conducted through this program will inform many areas, including but not limited to the following examples: implementing evidence-based practices for individuals with mental illnesses and substance use disorders; supporting the needs of veterans and military personnel for rehabilitation, mental health care, including suicide intervention/prevention, and supporting the many needs of the families of veterans and military personnel during and following service; increasing worker productivity, health, and well-being as well as reducing costs associated with absenteeism, mental and physical disability, and health care coverage; improving outcomes of young children and adolescents with developmental disabilities; improving learning and behavioral outcomes for children; and improving the mental health and resilience of family caregivers across the lifespan; reducing child abuse and domestic violence; reducing suicide and homicide.

B. Describe how the proposed program specifically relates to existing institutional strengths, such as programs of emphasis, other academic programs, and/or institutes and centers.

# **Institutional Strength**

Doctoral programs with an emphasis on behavioral health exist at institutions such as Arizona State University, Johns Hopkins, University of Maryland, and the University of Colorado. USF is particularly well positioned to join these leaders in offering a doctoral program focusing on behavioral health.

For more than 40 years, USF has been the home of the Louis de la Parte Florida Mental Health Institute (FMHI). The FMHI mission is to conduct applied research and evaluation to improve the behavioral health of the diverse populations within Florida communities. The proposed program builds on the faculty strengths initiated through FMHI and now through the College of Behavioral & Community Sciences. Some highlights of various projects and activities over the past 40 years are listed below to demonstrate institutional strength and capacity to offer the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences.

- 1984: FMHI was designated as a National Research and Training Center for Children's Mental Health.
- 1989: The Florida Legislature invited FMHI to participate on the Study Commission on Child Welfare. Based on the Commission's report, lawmakers passed the Bradley McGee Act (named for a young child who died as the result of severe abuse) which provided funding for 628 additional child welfare workers.
- 1989: The Center for Autism & Related Disabilities was established at FMHI to provide support and assistance for families and service providers of individuals who have autism or autism spectrum disorder. Still active today, FMHI's leadership in autism became evident in 1987 when faculty published a policy paper entitled Toward a Florida State Plan for Autism.
- 1995: The House Select Committee on Child Abuse and Neglect invited FMHI to participate in the Florida Inter-University Consortium for Child and Family Studies, a five-year longitudinal study on the relationship of family violence, child abuse, juvenile crime, and school behavior problems.
- 1996: The Legislature appointed FMHI faculty to serve on the State Steering Committee on Managed Behavioral Healthcare.
- 1996: FMHI was asked by the Florida Legislature to help revise the Baker Act, Florida's civil
  commitment law. In 2005, FMHI established the Baker Act Reporting Center which analyzes
  statewide Baker Act data and provides Baker Act training for law enforcement personnel, mental
  health professionals, hospital personnel, attorneys, advocates, case managers, nursing home
  staff, and protective service workers. The Center produces annual reports for AHCA and the state
  legislature to inform public policy.
- 1997: FMHI designed and implemented specialized treatment for offenders with co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders for the Department of Corrections.
- 1997: FMHI prepared the *Mental Health Parity: National and State Perspectives Report* for the Florida Legislature to assist with policy development on parity for mental health services.
- 1998: The National Rehabilitation Research & Training Center on Positive Behavioral Support was awarded to FMHI.
- 1998: The Triad Women's Project was established at FMHI to develop and evaluate innovative services for women and girls with a history of trauma and abuse as well as co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders
- 1995: FMHI initiated legislatively authorized training to prepare mental health professionals on methods to conduct evaluations for the criminal courts. The training continues today and focuses on competency-to-stand trial, sanity evaluations, and forensic assessment.
- 1999: FMHI faculty contributed to the first-ever U.S. Surgeon General's Report on Mental Health.
- 1999: FMHI provided leadership for the Florida Commission on Mental Health and Substance Abuse that conducted a systematic review of the state's mental health and substance abuse system.
- 2003: FMHI faculty participated in the development of the President's New Freedom Commission

- on Mental Health that still serves as a benchmark for recovery-oriented services.
- 2003: FMHI faculty appointed to the Commission for Scientific Medicine and Mental Health.
- 2008: FMHI faculty appointed to the Disaster Mental Health Subcommittee under the National Bio-defense Science Board Federal Advisory Committee.
- 2005: The Florida Center for Inclusive Communities was established at FMHI to provide training, technical assistance, and research to assist individuals with developmental disabilities and their families.
- 2005: FMHI faculty established the Medicaid Drug Therapy Management Program for Behavioral Health.
- 2005: FMHI faculty were appointed to the Institute of Medicine, National Academies of Science Committee on Ethical Considerations for the Protection of Prisoners Involved in Research.
- 2006: FMHI faculty were appointed to the Expert Panel on Cultural and Linguistic Competence for the National Evaluation of the Comprehensive Community Mental Health Services for Children and Their Families Program
- 2006: Now in its 20 year of operation, FMHI was awarded the Summer Research Institute by the National Science Foundation and subsequently the National Institute of Mental Health to prepare undergraduate students for graduate education and research careers in mental health.
- 2007: FMHI was designated as the home of Florida's Center for Child Welfare in collaboration with the Florida Department of Children and Families to ensure policies and best practices are accessible to child welfare professionals.
- 2007: FMHI faculty were appointed to the Florida Supreme Court Steering Committee on Families and Children in the Court, Mental Health Subcommittee.
- 2009: FMHI was designated as the National Center for Homelessness for Veterans to promote and enhance policy, research, and education to improve services to veterans. This center built on work of the FMHI Homelessness Prevention Project initiated in 1996.
- 2009: Faculty were appointed to the Council of State Governments National Center for Health, Mental Health, and Substance Abuse.
- 2012: Faculty were appointed to the American Bar Association Criminal Justice Mental Health Standards Task Force
- 2012: The Institute for Translational Research in Adolescent Behavioral Health was established focusing on translating research into policy and practice.
- 2014: The Florida Forensic Training Series was initiated to provide instruction in forensic evaluation of adults and juveniles involved in the legal system and to assess and manage patient risk for violence in acute care settings.
- 2014: Faculty were appointed to the Florida Supreme Court Task Force for Mental Health and Substance Abuse Issues in the Courts.
- 2015: For nearly 20 years, the Florida Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY) has focused on early intervention for children at risk of school failure. In 2012, The National Research and Evaluation Center for HIPPY USA was awarded to USF.
- 2015: Now in its 28<sup>th</sup> year, the annual research conference on Child, Adolescent, and Young Adult Behavioral Health conference will once again be sponsored by the Department of Child & Family Studies. This conference provides national leadership in research to improve service systems for children and youth with behavioral health challenges and their families.
- 2015: For the past 20 years, our faculty have evaluated Florida's behavioral health services for the Agency for Health Care Administration (AHCA) in the areas of child welfare, out-of-home care, nursing homes and assisted living facilities, pharmacy practices, recovery-oriented mental

- health services, methadone maintenance, and services to forensic populations.
- 2015: Since 1989, Florida Kids Count has collected and maintained a repository of statistical data and child well-being indicators in Florida to support research, program development, and policy analysis.

In 2008, FMHI joined with four other departments/schools at USF to form the College of Behavioral & Community Sciences. This new college structure facilitates interdisciplinary teaching and research with the original FMHI departments (Child & Family Studies and Mental Health law & Policy, cosponsors of the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences) and the new departments that joined the college, i.e., the School of Aging Studies, the School of Social Work, the Department of Criminology, and the Department of Communication Sciences & Disorders. Since the college was established, the faculty developed the first undergraduate program in the country in Behavioral Healthcare, which currently serves over 250 students each year, as well as a Master's degree in Child and Adolescent Behavioral Health.

The College of Behavioral & Community Sciences offers other resources that contribute to the institutional strength needed to offer the Ph.D. program. The Policy and Services Research Data Center houses statewide databases from the juvenile justice system, child welfare systems, Medicaid, Medicare, adult corrections system, mental health data, and all petitions for involuntary examination under Florida's civil commitment law. Through the PSRDC, doctoral students will have access to large administrative data sets to conduct their research projects if applicable. The PSRDC uses state-of-theart data security practices to ensure confidentiality of protected health information and research data. The College promotes community-based participatory research with the inclusion of consumers and family members in research projects. The College works closely with the Federation of Families and helped to establish the first Spanish-language chapter in the United States to serve our large and growing Latino population. Our faculty also serve on boards of local community provider agencies such as substance abuse agencies (ACTS and DACCO) and the Crisis Center. The FMHI Research Library, one of five libraries at USF, maintains a special collection on mental health, health care reform, outcomes and accountability, behavioral health services research, and public health policy. The Library is home to several special collections, including the John Maxwell Biasco Autism Collection, the Child Welfare Commission Papers, the Florida State Office of Mental Health Documents Collection, and the Multicultural Mental Health Collection. The FMHI librarians provide assistance to students including bibliographic instruction, electronic resources, and literature searches (see also the report from the USF Library).

#### **Planning Process**

The need for an interdisciplinary doctoral program in the College of Behavioral & Community Sciences first emerged in Fall, 2013. Three programs within the college did not have a doctoral program and expressed a need to enhance graduate offerings to augment their teaching and research capacities. In a discussion with department chairs, the idea emerged that it made

philosophical, curricular, and economical sense to develop one interdisciplinary doctoral degree rather than separate degrees for each program area.

As a result, an activity was included in the 2013-14 College Strategic Plan to "develop a proposal for an interdisciplinary doctoral program designed for CBCS departments that do not currently offer a Ph.D. program" (Activity 1.21). The draft strategic plan was presented to faculty at the 2014 Fall Faculty Assembly and a request for faculty input was requested. Following the Faculty Assembly, the plan was distributed to department chairs with a request to discuss the plan with their faculty and obtain feedback and suggestions for change. The strategic plan was subsequently adopted and a workgroup was established to explore the possibilities for the Ph.D. program.

The workgroup consisted of faculty and department chairs from the relevant departments who worked during the fall, 2014 semester to explore the programmatic focus and to develop the preproposal (see timeline and membership below). The consensus of the Work Group was to go forward with a proposal to establish an interdisciplinary program with a focus on Behavioral & Community Sciences. The pre-proposal was prepared and vetted with departments and the Graduate Council on December 12, 2014 and was subsequently reviewed by the USF Academic Program Advisory Council on March 31, 2015. The College was notified that the proposal had been added to the 2015-16 USF Work Plan. A faculty Ph.D. Proposal Writing Committee was established and began meeting in summer, 2015. Surveys of current students and alumni were conducted resulting in data indicating there is high student demand for the doctoral program. A chronology of planning activities follows:

# Accreditation and Specialized Reviews

No specialized accrediting is available for the proposed Ph.D. program. The program will undergo

program review with the Board of Governor's every seven years. The USF Graduate Council and Office of Graduate Studies also conduct a three-year review of all new graduate programs.

# Related Programs

Three programs within the College of Behavioral & Community Sciences are related to this proposal: B.S. in Behavioral Healthcare, M.S. in Child & Adolescent Behavioral Health, and the M.S. in Rehabilitation & Mental Health Counseling. The B.S. in Behavioral Healthcare and the M.S. in Child & Adolescent Behavioral Health have been established within the last four years and therefore have not yet undergone USF/BOG program review.

# **Accreditation of Related Programs**

Of the programs related to the establishment of the new degree program, only the Rehabilitation & Mental Health Counseling (RMHC) program has the option for accreditation. Although this program is related to the new degree, it is important to clarify that the accreditation of the RMHC program is associated with its master's level clinical degree. The proposed doctoral program does not include a clinical program.

The M.S. in Rehabilitation & Mental Health Counseling is accredited by the Council on Rehabilitation Education (CORE). The last USF/BOG program review was conducted in 2008 as part of the program's accreditation process. At that time, strengths of the program were identified as:

- Evidence of support of the College and University administration
- Quality and diversity of students
- Quality of the curriculum and faculty
- Evidence of employment one year following graduation
- Evidence of the quality of clinical training in community-based settings
- Evidence of student satisfaction upon graduation
- Number of graduates obtaining professional credentials post-graduation

Areas in need of attention were identified as: review all of the course syllabi and ensure they are consistent with CORE standards regarding attention to disability accommodation requirements; strengthen its recruitment and outreach efforts to under-represented groups; consider alternative financial resources and external funding opportunities to maximize enrollment of under-represented groups; provide evidence of a systematic approach to evaluating graduate achievement and recruitment and retention of graduate students; provide documentation that practicum as a pre-requisite for internship; document the direct service hours for practicum and internship. The program addressed all areas of concern within 12 months of receipt of the accreditation report. Each year, the department submits a report to CORE and receives recommendations. The annual reports recognized the changes the program had made and has continued to support the continued accreditation of the program. In the 2014-15 report, the program was asked to provide evidence that newly hired faculty teaching in Practicum I and II have the CRC credential (Certified Rehabilitation Counselor). Only two faculty need to complete the CRC process and they are both in the process of coursework to meet this requirement.

#### VIII. Curriculum

A. Describe the specific expected student learning outcomes associated with the proposed program. If a bachelor's degree program, include a web link to the Academic Learning Compact or include the document itself as an appendix.

The curriculum for the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences is characterized by interdisciplinarity in several ways:

- The program will be taught by a faculty from ten different disciplines, each bringing their unique perspectives from fields such as medical sociology, health psychology, health economics, developmental psychology, clinical psychology, rehabilitation, special education, educational psychology, school psychology, and social work.
- Students will take courses offered by five different disciplines (Behavioral Health, Public Health, Rehabilitation, Psychology, Education) thus providing students with a broad range of perspectives about various behavioral and social conditions.
- The doctoral core courses are designed to provide students with fundamental knowledge and skills applicable to all behavioral and community science disciplines yet will allow them to complete assignments by working in cross-disciplinary teams to study the social, economic, political, environmental, and institutional factors that relate to their area of specialization. Faculty from different disciplines will co-teach the courses and/or guest lecturers will participate in class discussions to reflect different perspectives.
- The pro-seminar series will provide a vehicle for students to integrate knowledge learned from various courses across the disciplines into a cohesive interdisciplinary research agenda for their dissertation and professional careers. Research colloquia will be incorporated into the pro-seminar series to provide students with the opportunity to gain interdisciplinary perspectives and engage in interdisciplinary discussions. Research colloquia are sponsored regularly by the College of Behavioral & Community Sciences such as the Mental Health, Guns, and Violence colloquia that involved researchers from psychiatry, criminology, and behavioral health as well as community professionals from law enforcement and behavioral healthcare.
- The dissertation committees for students will be composed of faculty from multiple disciplines to facilitate mentorship of interdisciplinary research.

#### **Learning Outcomes**

Students graduating with a Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will be able to:

- conduct research addressing the behavioral and socio-cultural factors that affect behavioral health and human development within the context of families and communities;
- (2) evaluate systems and services serving at-risk populations with a focus on evidence-based practices and community-based solutions;
- (3) design, implement, and evaluate interventions that influence positive behavioral outcomes;

- (4) design and conduct community-based research that integrates behavioral, developmental, and implementation sciences;
- (5) apply outcomes of research and program evaluation to policy development and systems change.

# B. Describe the admission standards and graduation requirements for the program.

# **Admission Requirements**

Applicants to the Ph.D. in Behavioral and Community Sciences must meet the following criteria to be considered for admission:

- 1. All applicants must comply with University policies and admission requirements, e.g., application, fee, official transcripts, GRE/TOEFL scores (see Graduate Admissions).
- 2. A bachelor's GPA of 3.5 or higher in the last 60 hours of undergraduate coursework based on a 4.0 grading scale. The completed degree must be in a field related to behavioral and community sciences, e.g., behavioral healthcare, human services, human development, psychology, sociology, anthropology, economics, public health, social work, counseling education, education.
- 3. Graduate Record Examination (GRE) taken within five years of application with a preferred profile of scores at or above the 50<sup>th</sup> percentile on the three subtests: verbal, quantitative, and analytical writing.
- 4. Evidence of written/analytical skills which will take two-forms:
  - A writing sample, such as a major paper, thesis, or research paper of which the student is the sole author, and
  - A personal goal statement of 2-3 pages that describes why the applicant wishes to obtain the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences.
- 5. Two formal letters of recommendation from faculty members or other professional personnel who have knowledge of the applicant's academic background, potential for success in graduate school, and/or commitment to a research career.
- Applicants with a master's degree may be eligible for admission to the program. Their transcripts will be evaluated to determine coursework that will be applicable toward the 90 hours of credit required for the doctoral program.

Prior to applying for the program, applicants are encouraged to contact faculty with whom they would like to study and discuss the fit between the student's area of research interest and the faculty member's research program.

# Graduation Requirements for the Ph.D. in Behavioral and Community Sciences

- 1. To complete the requirements for the degree, students must have registered as full-time students for at least two academic years (consecutive Fall and Spring semesters).
- 2. In addition, students must:
  - Complete a minimum of 90 hours including a minimum of 15 hours of doctoral core
    courses; 6 hours of research/statistics foundation courses; 12 hours of advanced
    research courses, 18 hours of didactic courses in behavioral health; 9 hours of
    specialization courses, 18 hours of directed research, and 12 hours of dissertation. The
    Plan of Study must include at least 18 hours of coursework in an area that will fulfill the
    SACS teaching requirement of 18 hours in the field to ensure eligibility for university
    positions.
  - Complete and pass the qualifying exam.
  - Complete and defend the dissertation. The dissertation will reflect a program of
    research with typically three studies that are formatted for or submitted for publication
    in scholarly journals. This body of work should reflect original research designed and
    conducted by the student under the supervision of one or more faculty advisors.
- C. #### **Total Number of Semester Credit Hours for Degree**

The Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will require a total of 90 hours post-baccalaureate.

# Directed Research (18 hours)

MHS 6915: Directed Research in Behavioral & Social Sciences (18 hours)

Students will complete 18 hours of Directed Research. Following the completion of the first six-hours of directed research, students will complete a research "product" such as a conference presentation, poster session, publication, portions of a grant proposal, literature review or other comparable product to demonstrate their progress in developing research proficiency. Ideally, this product will be associated with their dissertation topic. The remaining 12 hours of Directed Research will be conducted during the second and third year of study and will be conducted with the guidance of the student's major professor with research outcomes specified in the student's plan of study related to their eventual dissertation proposal.

#### Dissertation (12 hours)

MHS 7980: Dissertation Research (12 hours)

The dissertation will consist of original research designed and supervised by a faculty advisor. The student will select the faculty member who will serve as the major advisor within the first year of study. Each student will have a dissertation committee consisting of the major advisor and three other faculty members from different disciplines to reflect the interdisciplinary approach of the program. The student will write a dissertation proposal that outlines the completed project and will defend the proposal to obtain committee approval for beginning the dissertation. The dissertation will consist of a series of three articles with an introductory and conclusion chapter. The student will complete a public oral defense of the dissertation and the committee will judge the adequacy of the final document and the oral defense for approval for the Ph.D. degree.

# **Qualifying Exam/Doctoral Candidacy**

Students will be admitted to doctoral candidacy upon completion of a qualifying exam. The qualifying exam will require completion of a grant proposal suitable for supporting dissertation or early career research (e.g., F31 or R03) and an oral examination.

# MHS 5745: Applied Qualitative Research Methods (3 hours)

This course is designed to provide students with an understanding of applied qualitative research methods and to assist them in applying these methods to research projects.

#### MHS 5746: Applied Quantitative Research Methods (3 hours)

Reviews quantitative research methods while focusing on the application of such concepts in real research contexts preparing students to understand the process and ethical application of quantitative methodology.

# MHS 6065: Issues and Trends in Developmental Disabilities (3 hours)

This interdisciplinary disability studies course provides students with a background in the history of disabilities and an overview of the impact of and latest trends in disabilities across the life span.

# MHS 6066: Systems, Services, and Supports in Developmental Disabilities (3 hours)

This course provides students with the tools and understanding needed to evaluate service systems for children and adolescents with developmental disabilities. Lessons address services, systems of care, and policies affecting services.

# MHS 6067: Evidence-Based Practices in Behavioral Health for Children & Adolescents With Developmental Disabilities (3 hours)

This course introduces students to a variety of evidence- based behavioral health practices for children and adolescents with developmental disabilities. Lessons address identification and evaluation of evidence-based practices, research, and ethics. Pre Req: MHS 6065

# MHS 6068: Community-Based Behavior Health Interventions for Culturally Diverse Youth (3 hours) This course focuses on behavioral health issues and interventions for culturally diverse youth. Topics include youth and family strengths and needs, research and intervention approaches, and relevant policies at global, national, and local levels.

#### MHS 6069: Child & Adolescent Behavioral Health (3 hours)

Provides an introduction to a variety of topics relevant to child and adolescent behavioral health, including its history, settings for service provision, and various factors that shape best practice approaches to meet the needs of youth and families.

#### MHS 6072: Epidemiology and Prevention in Children's Mental Health (3 hours)

Provides introduction to epidemiological research methods in children's mental health; prepares professionals to critically evaluate research literature and to design studies to better affect children's mental health.

# MHS 6075: Creating Cultural Competence in Behavioral Health Organizations (3 hours)

The course explores the need of cultural competence in provision of mental health services in a multicultural society. The course examines culture and ethnicity, multiculturalism, and intercultural communication. The course examines cultural competence at behavioral health systems and service provision levels.

# MHS 6095: Family-Centered Interdisciplinary Systems of Care (3 hours)

Provides an overview of a SOC approach to children's mental health; prepares professionals to work in respectful partnership with families/youth and to participate in interdisciplinary teams serving children and their families.

# MHS 6410: Intensive Individualized Positive Behavior Support (3 hours)

Provides class participants with knowledge and skills necessary to develop, implement, and evaluate the impact of positive behavior support at an individual level including functional behavior assessment and behavior support in various settings.

#### MHS 6437: Family Perspectives on Behavioral Health Disparities (3 hours)

Examines behavioral health disparities from a family systems perspective, with consideration of how they are influenced by historical context, generations, immigration, social and physical environmental factors, discrimination, and group heterogeneity. Pre Req: MHS 6420 or RCS 6440

#### MHS 6494: Women's Mental Health (3 hours)

This course focuses on women's mental health and substance use disorders through a detailed examination of the interaction of trauma, mental health, and substance use disorders that affect the lives of women across the life span.

#### MHS 6508: Wraparound Interventions and the System of Care (3 hours)

Explores the wraparound philosophy and focuses on developing supportive community structures for the delivery of wraparound services. Research, evaluation, and methodology in wraparound interventions are addressed. Unrestricted/non-repeatable.

# MHS 6605: Behavior Challenges in Young Children (3 hours)

Focuses on the application of promotion, prevention, and intervention framework to promote the social development of young children and address behavioral issues through the Pyramid Model within early childhood and intervention programs/systems

# MHS 6607: Behavioral Consultation and Collaborative Systems Change (3 hours)

This course provides participants with the knowledge and skills necessary to develop, implement, and evaluate the impact of behavior consultation across a multi-tiered system of support. Pre Req: MHS 6608, 6605, or 6410

#### MHS 6608: Schoolwide Positive Behavior Support (3 hours)

Provides class participants with the knowledge and skills necessary to develop, implement, and evaluate the systemic impact of positive behavior support on the behavioral needs of all students from Pre-K to 12, including those with disabilities.

# MHS 6641: Mental Health Infomatics (3 hours)

This course examines how information technologies and knowledge management affect access to mental health and impact policy. Current applications include the management of mental health databases and the development of behavioral telehealth programs.

# MHS 6706: Child & Adolescent Behavioral Health Policy (3 hours)

This course focuses on critical policy issues affecting child and adolescent behavioral health services in the U.S. Historical, legislative and policy making issues will be discussed, and U.S. policies will be examined within an inclusive global context.

# \*\*MHS 6741: Community Based Research & Evaluation in Behavioral Sciences (3 hours)

This course provides in-depth study of community-based participatory research and evaluation (CBPRE) and examines critical issues in research design, ethical considerations, and the use of CBPRE to promote social change and public policy.

# MHS 6900: Substance Abuse, Crime, and the Justice System (3 hours)

This seminar considers problems of substance abuse and its consequences for crime, health, and the justice system. Specific topics include the social consequences of substance abuse, drugs and violence, treatment alternatives to incarceration (e.g., drug courts), treatment of substance abuse and co-occurring mental/other health disorders, prevention programs for juvenile offenders, drug legalization and decriminalization, and recent state and national drug policy initiatives.

# MHS 6900: Co-Morbidity and Physical Disorders (3 hours)

This course examines the co-morbidity of mental and physical disorders, taking a lifespan epidemiological approach. Emphasis is placed upon theories and empirical research elucidating co-morbidities, risk factors, and mechanisms.

# MHS 6915: Directed Research in Behavioral & Social Sciences (variable)

Students work directly with a faculty mentor in a one-on-one research experience in the area of behavioral and social sciences research and design, conduct, and disseminate an independently designed and conducted research project.

# MHS 6938: Grant Writing Seminar (3 hours)

This course provides students with the knowledge and skills necessary to develop, submit, and evaluate grants and contracts related to their areas of research or professional interest.

#### MHS 7740: Mental Health Planning, Evaluation, and Accountability (3 hours)

Provides a comprehensive overview of planning, evaluation and accountability methods within a systems context. Emphasis is placed on a broad range of quantitative and qualitative methods.

# MHS 7748: Statistical Applications in Translational Research and Evaluation (3 hrs)

The course covers the basic applications of statistical concepts and techniques essential to translational research and evaluation in child and adolescent behavioral health.

#### MHS 7749: Applications in Dissemination and Implementation Science (3 hours)

This course covers competencies in the application of translational science necessary to understand, evaluate, and conduct dissemination and implementation research in child and adolescent behavioral health.

# \*\*MHS 7707: Interdisciplinary Approaches to Behavioral Health Policy and Systems Change (3 hours)

This course provides doctoral students with the knowledge and skills necessary to develop, implement, and evaluate systems and policy related to their areas of research and professional interest within behavioral health. Participants will learn through course readings, application of an overarching policy and system conceptual framework, and mentored collaborative and self-directed activities.

# \*\*MHS 7491: Evidence-Based Practices in Behavioral & Community Sciences (3 hours)

This course explores and applies strategies used to judge and identify evidence-based practices in assessment, intervention, and therapeutic practices in behavioral health and related areas.

# \*\*MHS 7721: Professional Seminar in Behavioral & Community Sciences (1 hour may be repeated 3 times with different topics)

Reading, discussion, and application of topics related to the professional development of doctoral students: teaching at the college or university level, dissertation topic selection and literature review processes, developing a research agenda, and building professional skills such as career networking, publication in peer-reviewed journals, grant writing, and time management.

#### MHS 7980: Dissertation Research (12 hours)

Students conduct original research as part of the requirements for the doctoral degree.

#### EDF 6213: Biological Bases of Behavior (3 hours)

Human biological development and its influence upon learning and behavior.

# EDF 6432: Foundations of Measurement (3 hours)

Basic measurement concepts, role of measurement in education, construction of teacher-made tests and other classroom assessments, interpretation of standardized tests, and fundamental descriptive statistics for use in test interpretation.

# EDF 6407: Statistical Analysis for Educational Research (3 hours)

Theory and application of statistical procedures to problems in education: (1) descriptive statistics, (2) Probability-sampling distributions, (3) Inferential statistics-interval estimation, tests of significance (z, t, F-one way ANOVA).

#### EDF 6481: Foundations of Educational Research (3 hours)

Analysis of major types of educational research designs, including experimental, correlational, ex post facto and case studies. Pre Reg: EDF 6432

# EDF 7408: Statistical Analysis for Educational Research II

Theory and application of statistical USF Graduate Catalog 2014-2015 Section 27 Course Descriptions 876 Educational Research II procedures to problems in education: (1) ANOVA-factorial; ANCOVA; (2) multiple correlation and regression -- a specific technique and a general approach to data analysis. Pre Req: 6407

#### **EDF 7412: Application of Structural Equation Modeling (3 hours)**

Application of structural equation modeling in educational research, including path models, confirmatory factor analysis, structural modeling with latent variables, and latent growth curve models. Pre Req: EDF 7408

# **EDF 7436: Rasch Measurement Models (3 hours)**

Introduction to a family of Rasch models. Estimation procedures of item and ability parameters. Applications of Rasch models for dichotomous and polytomous data, such as item construction/selection and differential item functioning (DIF).

# EDF 7439: Foundations of Item Response Theory (3 hours)

Basic foundation underlying Item Response Theory (IRT) as well as most common applications in educational and psychological measurement, in terms of the theoretical basis, practical aspects, and specific applications. Pre Req: EDF 6432

## **EDF 7474: Applied Multilevel Modeling in Education (3 hours)**

Helps students develop skills in defining, estimating, testing, and reporting the results of multilevel models. Design issues, model specification, estimation, statistical software, and model evaluation will be discussed.

#### **GEY 6402: Statistical Methods in Aging Research (3 hours)**

The major goal of this course is to deliver fundamental quantitative research concepts that are useful in aging research. Other goals include hands-on exposure to secondary data analysis.

#### **GEY 6403: Multivariate Statistical Analysis (3 hours)**

This course will give students experience with many of today's advanced statistical techniques. Primary emphasis will be on the description of these methods of analysis, situations in which their application is most appropriate, and hands-on experience.

# PHC 6193: Qualitative Methods in Community Health Research (3 hours)

This course provides a general introduction to ethnographic field methods, emphasizing systematic approaches to collection and analysis of qualitative data. Students will learn to identify the kinds of research problems for which qualitative methods are appropriate, and to critique qualitative research in terms of design, technique, analysis and interpretation

#### PHC 6401: Homelessness: Implications for Behavioral Health (3 hours)

A study of the structural, personal, treatment, and sociopolitical issues related to homelessness. Quantitative and qualitative data are reviewed to examine the experience of homelessness, pathways into homelessness including mental health, substance abuse, and violence/trauma.

#### PHC 6505: Program Planning in Community Health (3 hours)

This course is designed to prepare students to analyze the planning and development process for community health programs.

# PHC 6539: Foundations in Adolescent Behavioral Health (3 hours)

Examines the interaction of epidemiology, disease surveillance, social neuroscience, environmental vulnerability, pharmacology, and developmental risk & resiliency that affect youth populations at risk for drug use and mental disorders.

#### PHC 6725: Focus Group Research Strategies (3 hours)

This course is an intensive overview of focus group procedures. Attention will be placed on question development, moderator skills, analysis strategies and planning critical logistical details of focus group interviews, and analyzing results of focus group interviews.

# PHC 7054: Advanced Biostatistics Methods (3 hours)

This course introduces students to both theoretical and practical problems in specialized advanced topics in Biostatistics. Alternate topics include Applied Multivariate Statistics, Nonparametric Methods, Spatial Statistics in Health Sciences and Advanced Sampling Design.

#### PHC 7056: Longitudinal Data Analysis (3 hours)

This course covers the foundation of biostatistical inference, required for biostatistic program. Topics include likelihood theory, modern Bayes theory, estimation and testing, non-parametric theory.

#### PHC 6708: Evaluation Methods in Community Health (3 hours)

This course will cover contextual issues surrounding evaluation, evaluation designs and methodological issues, steps involved in conducting an evaluation, communicating the results, and ensuring that evaluation findings are used by intended users. Pre Req PHC 6505

# PSB 6056: Physiological Psychology (3 hours)

Introduction to data and research methods in Physiological Psychology. Topics include neurophysiology and neuroanatomy, sensory and motor systems, and internal regulation.

#### PSY 6217: Research Methods and Measurement (3 hours)

Course in research strategies, design and analysis, and measurement theory in psychological experimentation. Inferential statistics, ANOVA, correlation methods, and interpretation.

# PUP 5607: Public Policy and Health Care (3 hours)

The study of health care policy as it relates to the policy process in the American setting.

# RCS 5080: Medical Aspects of Disability (3 hours)

A survey of medical conditions and disabilities encountered by rehabilitation and mental health counselors. Examines the relationship of client handicaps, physical and mental, to rehabilitation and mental health programming.

# RCS 5450: Fundamentals of Substance Abuse (3 hours)

An overview of alcohol and other drug abuse. Explores the extent and rate of abuse in the United States, causes, biology, psychosocial aspects, legal aspects, and treatment.

# RCS 5480: Human Growth & Development (3 hours)

Human development theory as applied in psychotherapy and case management rehabilitation, mental health, and addiction settings.

#### RCS 5780: Legal, Ethical, Professional Standards and Issues in Counseling (3 hours)

An overview of all aspects of professional functioning including history, roles, organizational structures, ethics, standards and credentialing. Contemporary and developing issues in the field of professional counseling are addressed.

# RCS 6930: Seminar in Rehabilitation Counseling (3 hours)

Selected issues and problems in rehabilitation counseling with subject and scope to be determined by instructor. Topics include Medical Family Therapy, Obesity and Eating Disorders, and Principles of Personal Change.

The Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences will be offered using traditional, face-to-face delivery interactions on the USF Tampa Campus. Given the research-intensive focus of the doctoral program and its emphasis on research mentorship, no anticipated collaborations with other universities are anticipated in the basic structure of the program. However, it is possible that the research interests of individual students would benefit from collaboration with faculty from other universities and these opportunities will be pursued to support student research needs.

#### IX. Faculty Participation

Faculty associated with this degree hold degrees that reflect the interdisciplinary objectives of this proposal. They have earned degrees in Behavioral Medicine, Medical Sociology, Health Psychology, Health Sciences/Social Work, Community Psychology, Human Development, Child Development & Family Relations, Clinical Psychology, Psychology & Adult Development, Counseling Psychology, Developmental & Child Psychology, Experimental Psychology, Educational Psychology & Statistics, Gerontology, Law & Psychology, Sociology, Rehabilitation Science, Social Work, and Special Education. In addition, many faculty members have completed post-doctoral training or internships in Psychiatry, Pediatric Psychiatry, Medicine, Mental Health Services Research, and Law/Psychiatry.

The faculty members who will participate in the proposed program have outstanding credentials to teach in this program and mentor doctoral students in research. Even though the departments have not yet offered a doctoral program within their own disciplines, the faculty have actively participated as members of dissertation committees and have chaired or co-chaired committees. Thirty-five faculty members in the departments most closely affiliated with the proposed program have served as members of dissertation committees just since 2010. Of those 35, 21 have served as chair or co-chair.

The faculty will contribute to the program by teaching courses, mentoring students in research/teaching, and providing professional guidance to students regarding academic and research career preparation. Because the faculty obtain a large amount of grants and contracts to support their research (over \$20 million per year), they will also mentor students in grant writing and proposal review and will include students as members of their research teams. Faculty will also be

able to include requests for funding for graduate assistantships in their proposals.

A faculty member will be appointed to serve as Director of the Ph.D. program and will oversee all aspects of the admission process, student mentoring process, and time to degree completion. An admissions committee will be established consisting of faculty members associated with the program.



The departments associated with this program have undergone a significant shift in mission in the past ten years. The Department of Child & Family Studies (CFS) and the Department of Mental Health Law & Policy (MHLP) were research units within the Louis de la Parte Florida Mental Health Institute for 35 years prior to joining the College of Behavioral & Community Sciences. As such, the primary mission of these departments was to conduct research in the area of mental health and substance use. Although faculty in the departments taught courses for other departments at USF, they did not offer academic degree programs. A shift began to occur when the FMHI departments merged with five departments from another USF college to form the College of Behavioral & Community Sciences in 2008. The departments maintained their research mission and productivity but began to develop academic degree programs to share their expertise with USF students. These departments are now home to the following programs:



As can be seen in the following graphs, student headcount, SCH productivity, and the number of degrees granted has increased significantly since the departments adopted an academic teaching mission.


Student Headcount: CFS and MHLP

The faculty in both departments have also been productive in publishing in peer-reviewed journals. The 31 faculty in CFS published 326 articles between 2010 and 2014 for an average of 65.2 articles per year and 2.1 per faculty member. The 22 faculty in MHLP published 304 articles in the same time period for an average of 61 articles per year and 2.8 per faculty member. The detailed information for these departments is provided in the following table.

These same faculty have published 26 books in the past five years, 181 chapters in books, and made more than 1,250 presentations at national and international conferences to disseminate their research.

The Dean of the USF Libraries provided an extensive report of the library resources available to support the proposed program and concluded that "the collections of the USF Tampa Library and affiliates are sufficient to support the Ph.D. in Behavioral & Community Sciences.

The USF Libraries hold 47,964 print titles and host 11,791 electronic titles related to the proposed program in behavioral and Community Sciences. The USF Libraries hold 1,619 print titles and hosts 2,042 electronic titles in the discipline of behavioral and Community Sciences.

The USF Libraries manage and make available more than 900 electronic databases. Because of the interdisciplinary nature of behavioral and Community Sciences, researchers with a particular focus on mental health—especially those with a strong emphasis in counseling, rehabilitation, and law and policy—and child and family studies may use databases in a range of disciplines including, but not limited to: Psychology, Rehabilitation and Mental Health Counseling, Social Work, Law, and Political Science, Public Administration. Within the combined subject disciplines represented by behavioral and Community Sciences, the USF Libraries provide access to 26 "Key Sources" and 60 "Article Databases." No additional library resources are needed to support the proposed program. The USF Library will absorb the annual cost of maintaining the collections needed for this program.

### Classroom/Teaching Laboratory Space

The proposed program can be accommodated within the existing classroom space available to the college. The program will be housed in the MHC and MHA buildings on the USF Tampa campus. This complex consists of a 200,000 SF building that houses faculty offices and research facilities, a data center, research library, instructional classrooms, media center, and teleconference facilities as well as a 10,000 SF conference center which is used for classroom space.

### Research Support Space

There are several features within the MHC/MHA complex that will support the proposed program. The Policy and Services Research Data Center houses statewide databases from the juvenile justice system, child welfare systems, Medicaid, Medicare, adult corrections system, mental health data, and all Baker Act petitions for involuntary examination under Florida's civil commitment law. Through the PSRDC, students will have access to large administrative data sets to conduct their research projects if applicable. The PSRDC uses state-of-the-art data security practices to ensure confidentiality of protected health information and research data.

The CBCS Student Computer Laboratory houses 32 computers with SPSS, Atlas.ti, and Qualtrics licenses. The computer lab will be available for instruction purposes for doctoral students in statistics and data analysis classes as well as be available for independent use by all doctoral students.

The FMHI Research Library is home to several special collections, including the John Maxwell Biasco Autism Collection, the Child Welfare Commission Papers, the Florida State Office of Mental Health Documents Collection, and the Multicultural Mental Health Collection. The library has established a Student Multidisciplinary Research Center to provide a space for student groups to meet to discuss their instructional and research assignments and work on research projects. The librarians provide bibliographic and research assistance to students.

The program does not require additional research laboratory space to support this program. Most of the research of the faculty is conducted in community settings. Therefore new spaced for doctoral student research is not needed.

Thank you for the opportunity to review the proposed PhD in Behavioral and Community Sciences at the University of South Florida. Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University currently offers a Doctor of Public (DrPH) with two specialty areas: (1) epidemiology and biostatistics, and (2) behavioral sciences and health education. The Behavioral Sciences and Health Education specialization also includes a subspecialty in maternal and child health, which may overlap with the Child and Adolescent Behavioral Health focus of the proposed program. There may be additional overlap in the Behavioral Health Disparities specialization as FAMU's DrPH has a particular focus on addressing health disparities experienced by traditionally underserved populations as part of the overall mission of the Institute of Public Health (IPH). The proposal indicated that this specialization would include disparities within certain populations.

Because of the general mission of FAMU's Institute of Public Health and the offerings related to maternal and child health, there is the potential for duplication of coursework between FAMU's specialization in Behavioral Sciences and Health Education, and the two proposed specializations for USF in Behavioral Health Disparities and Child and Adolescent Behavioral Health. While duplication may exist in these two areas, we do not believe this program will have a negative impact on the enrollment and degree productivity of FAMU's DrPH and offer full support of the proposed degree.

### External Consultant's Report on USF's New PhD Proposal in Behavioral Health & Community Sciences

### 1. Is the program responding to an important societal need at this time?

I believe the proposed PhD degree in Behavioral Health & Community Sciences does respond to important societal needs that will intensify with growing populations in the years ahead.

The needs that this program will address—in areas of mental health, substance abuse, and developmental disorders—are among the major health care challenges facing the State of Florida and the United States as a whole. As a result, the burden of mental illness, substance abuse, and developmental disabilities on individuals, families, the economy and our society is high. Current expenditures on individuals with these problems make up a growing proportion of federal, state, and local budgets. More evidence-based information is needed about what works, for whom and under what circumstances so that tax dollars care be targeted to truly helpful interventions and away from the many costly services now provided that do not work. Investigators with high-level research skills and an interdisciplinary understanding of these problems—such as those who will emerge from this PhD program—will be needed to support responsible public policies and service program administration in the years ahead.

### 2. Is the interdisciplinary, conceptual design of the program consistent with the needs in the field?

The prospectus for the PhD program provides clear documentation of the growing populations of people with behavioral health and related community service needs in Florida and elsewhere and the ways the proposed curriculum will develop student research skills to address these needs within an interdisciplinary framework.

The degree program is designed to prepare students to conduct interdisciplinary research and to apply the outcomes of research to the improvement of behavioral health systems and community services. Policies and practices now emphasize integration and coordination of services across mental health, substance abuse, disability, and related domains. Efforts to design, implement, and assess the effectiveness of these efforts on growing populations of individuals with behavioral and related needs increasingly require the type of interdisciplinary-trained investigators that this program will produce.

### 3. Does the program structure and curriculum suggest that students in the program will have a high quality experience and be prepared to pursue research careers?

I believe the PhD program, both in its structure and curriculum, is well thought out in ways that will equip its graduates with the high-level research skills needed to pursue research careers focused on improving the knowledge base for behavioral health and related community services.

The structure of the program is a four-year, 90-credit degree with a core of required and elective courses drawn from 54 courses organized into nine specialization areas related to behavioral health and disabilities. Within each specialization, students elect courses to meet distribution requirements in consultation with their faculty advisor(s). Faculty from ten social science and behavioral disciplines will be engaged in training. Roughly 57% of the total degree requirements (51 of 90 credit hours) are devoted to research methods and statistics, directed research with individual faculty, and dissertation research under the supervision of a faculty-mentor and committee of interdisciplinary faculty.

These requirements will expose students to the latest methods and analysis techniques in applied social science and behavioral research and provide hands-on opportunities to apply them in supervised research projects. The result will be students with highly marketable job skills to secure positions in academe, public agencies, and community research settings.

### 4. Do the faculty associated with this program have the expertise and experience to offer doctoral level education?

My review of the 22 faculty CVs that were shared with me indicates that the proposed degree program will be supported by an outstanding group of faculty who together have the expertise and experience required to offer doctoral-level education.

As is always the case, the strength of a PhD program is measured by the quality of its faculty resources and USF has an unparalleled faculty to support the range of component specializations. This group of faculty is unique among other public and private universities in Florida. All faculty members are PhD-trained researchers. Most have extensive publication records in high quality journals in behavioral health, disability, aging and related areas. Many have been teaching PhD-level courses and chairing/serving on dissertation committees in other USF departments (many with joint or courtesy appointments) and at other universities. As a group, they have an impressive record of external grant funding from federal, state, and local sources as well as private foundations. The variety, amounts, and durations of funded research will provide opportunities for PhD students to engage in hands-on

research under faculty supervision will likely provide stipends to support PhD students as research assistants during their  $2^{nd}$  through  $4^{th}$  years.

### 5. Do you have any recommendations to improve the program structure and curriculum for the program?

Overall, the structure and curriculum presents a well-designed configuration for a PhD program in behavioral and community sciences. My comments below are meant to highlight a few areas where further consideration might enhance program effectiveness.

Often academic programs are interdisciplinary in name only. In practice, many turn out to be multi-disciplinary where students are exposed to faculty from multiple disciplines, each espousing her own disciplinary approach, so that students end up having to integrate disciplinary perspectives on their own, if at all. To avoid this outcome, faculty members from various disciplines have to learn together to promote a truly interdisciplinary educational environment for themselves and their students. Two recommendations on how this can be promoted within the PhD degree in Behavioral Health & Community Sciences are the following:

- a. Having faculty from different disciplines co-teach core courses. Four of the five core courses are amenable to this format. While co-teaching would increase the staffing costs associated with the program somewhat, it would be a big boost to the interdisciplinary educational objectives of the program. A variant, and perhaps more efficient approach, is to have a single instructor for one or more of these courses with a series of other faculty from different disciplines as guest presenters. Either option would help to overcome the single-discipline approach that predominates in graduate course offerings at most universities, even those aspiring to an interdisciplinary education.
- b. Having weekly or bi-weekly colloquia (aka 'brown bag lunches' or 'Friday afternoon gatherings'). In this format, faculty from the various disciplines within the College can present their current work to both students and other faculty members where the main focus is on learning about a disciplinary approach but where the discussion centers on how other disciplines might frame the same focal issue, how they might use different data collection or analytic approaches, or draw different conclusions from the same findings. One or two credit hours can be assigned to these colloquia on a semester basis where each student is asked to compose a reflective statement at end of term about what they learned from these sessions and how these understandings might be applied to their own interest areas. Students can continue to participate in colloquia on an ongoing basis throughout their 4 yr. program to enhance peer-learning opportunities and so that newer students can benefit from the interdisciplinary understandings of advanced students.

### 6. Based on your review, is the program being offered in a cost effective and efficient manner?


The business case for the proposed PhD degree is remarkably efficient. No new faculty hires are needed, as faculty within USF's College of Behavioral & Community Sciences will meet all of the teaching and advising requirements. Further, only four new courses are planned.

A single PhD degree for the College (with sub-specializations) is much more reasonable and efficient than individual PhD degrees for each Department. The size (N=7) of entering cohorts is also reasonable and affords the program an opportunity to evaluate whether market demands might call for expanded cohorts in future years.

First year students are subsidized through USF funds and then are supported as research assistants on faculty research grants during the remainder of their 4-yr. program. This package will be attractive to prospective students and will help to recruit capable students who might otherwise be inclined to matriculate elsewhere. The prospectus does mention seeking externally funded training grants but no specific plans are presented. Clearly, such funding would be a real plus and would help to alleviate the burden on faculty research grants as the sole or primary mechanism for supporting advanced graduate students.

7. Do you concur that students from this program will be able to obtain entry-level teaching and research positions in universities; behavioral health research positions and evaluation specialists in local, state, and federal agencies; and grant specialist positions at nonprofit, private research organizations?

I agree. Graduates from the proposed PhD degree in Behavioral & Community Sciences will have the skills and knowledge to secure positions in academic, governmental, and private research organizations. The proposed PhD program is targeted at policy and service problems within Florida and the U.S. as a whole regarding behavioral health and related problems. Graduates will acquire substantive knowledge about these problems, high-level research skills, and the shortfalls of current efforts to address them. Graduates will become leaders in the next generation of scholars, teachers, and administrators who can improve the lifechances of people with behavioral, disability, and associated challenges.

The faculty in our college have developed a proposal to establish a Ph.D. in Behavioral and Community Sciences. The program is an interdisciplinary degree that builds on existing courses offered within the CBCS departments as well as those from other USF academic units. Only four new didactic courses are required to offer the degree as well as additional sections of directed research and dissertation research. No new faculty are needed to offer the proposed doctoral program. As the external consultant stated, "the business case for the proposed Ph.D. degree is remarkably efficient."

The only additional resources required to implement the program will be funds to support graduate assistantships. Graduate assistants will be supported by E&G funds during their first year of doctoral studies. The funds to support these new assistantships will be provided through reallocation of resources within the college budget. During the remaining years of their doctoral studies, doctoral students will assume research assistantships supported by grant funding. The proposal includes a plan to expand the research assistantship funding base through contracts and grants and demonstrates the capacity of the college to provide these resources.

In summary, no new resources are being requested to support the proposed doctoral program.

# **SOW 6405: Foundations of Social Work Research and Statistics** Fall 2010

This course introduces students to the various questions, methods, designs, measurements, basic statistical techniques, qualitative methods and analysis, and ethical issues in social work research. With an understanding of how research is conducted, students will be able to view research as a scientific problem solving method which will help him/her develop and utilize critical thinking skills necessary for professional practice. This course also provides information needed to assist students to critically assess and evaluate the use of those explanatory and change theories, which serve as the theoretical base for preparation of clinical practice in this graduate program and serve in the formulation of research questions and assessment of intervention outcomes.

# MHS 7747 Measurement Issues in Behavioral Health Services Research and Evaluation Spring 2010

Co-design and teaching of a three-credit, advanced level graduate course focused on measurement issues in mental health and substance abuse services research and evaluation methods. The course focuses on the 1) development, 2) selection, and 3) use of individual, program, and systems-level process and outcome measures for conducting behavioral health services research and program evaluation. The course will examine measurement issues associated with both quantitative and qualitative measurement strategies. The course content is divided into 4 primary sections: fundamentals of qualitative and quantitative measurement, special measurement topics in behavioral health services research and evaluation, practice issues in measurement, and review and examination of frequently used qualitative and quantitative measures and strategies.

MHS 6610 Financing of Children's Mental Health Services Spring 2006, 08, 11 Design and teaching of a web-based, distance learning master's level course in the Graduate Certificate in Children's Mental Health. The course promotes critical thinking about financing strategies and structures that support the development of effective systems of care in children's mental health. The course assist the student to better understand and become equipped to actively participate in the development of appropriate financing mechanisms for services and supports for children with mental health problems and their families. The course considers the theoretical, evaluative, economic and political issues related to the financing of children's mental health services. The course provides distance learning instruction and field application of learning. The course format includes lectures, participation in online discussions, student presentations posted online, experiential learning, and a final paper.

### SOW 6931 Qualitative Methods in Social Work Research Fall 2005

Design and teaching of a doctoral level course in the School of Social Work, College of Arts and Sciences. The course furthers critical thinking about social work qualitative research and assists the doctoral student to better understand and become equipped to fulfill a role as social work researcher. The course considers the theoretical, scientific, and political issues related to qualitative research, and provides classroom instruction and field application of qualitative methods to study social work problems. Students learn the kinds of research questions and problems for which qualitative methods are appropriate, and to critically examine qualitative social work research in terms of design, technique, analysis, and interpretation.

### PHC 6934 Children's Mental Health Services

Fall 2001-Present

Teach a graduate level course in the College of Public Health at USF. The course prepares students to work in partnership with families and other professionals in a variety of settings to meet the individual needs of children with mental health problems and their families. The curriculum examines theories of systems of care, common children's mental health diagnoses and treatment interventions, financing, and systems change.
