## Articulation Coordinating Committee Policy Regarding the Evaluation and Awarding of Postsecondary Credit for Law Enforcement Training: Process Overview

## Section 1.0: Introduction

Developed by the Statewide Workgroup for Law Enforcement Training and adopted by the Articulation Coordinating Committee (ACC), this policy regarding the awarding of postsecondary credit or clock hours for law enforcement and corrections training in Florida is in accordance with section (s.) 1004.0981, Florida Statutes (F.S.), and is intended for adoption by the State University System of Florida Board of Governors (BOG) and the Florida State Board of Education (SBOE). Informed by state statute and the rules and regulations of the two higher education governing boards, this document establishes a statewide process for prioritizing and determining postsecondary course equivalences and the minimum postsecondary credit or career education clock hours that must be awarded for law enforcement training and experience. Upon approval by BOG and SBOE, the ACC will implement this process to facilitate the review of law enforcement training and experience and will approve a prioritized list of course equivalencies within one year, which will be updated annually.

## Section 2.0: Procedures for the Development of the Credit for Law Enforcement Experience Equivalency List

To implement the provisions of s. 1004.0981, F.S., a list of postsecondary course equivalencies (hereafter referred to as the Credit for Law Enforcement Training Equivalency List) will be established to provide consistent statewide award of credit. This list will be published by the Office of Articulation and approved by the Board of Governors and State Board of Education annually. The following process, as adopted by the ACC, will be used to establish and annually update the list.

Phase One: Initial Course Review to Establish the Credit for Law Enforcement Training Equivalency

Step 1 – Identify potential training courses for evaluation	The Office of Articulation will obtain post-basic training course information from the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission (CJSTC), including the course numbers, titles, and course content. Because the CJSTC trainings are offered statewide and use a standard curriculum, the CJSTC course catalog will serve as the foundation for the establishment of the Credit for Law Enforcement Training Equivalency List.	
Step 2 – Form discipline committee	The ACC will establish a statewide discipline committee for Criminal Justice and Law Enforcement Training composed of representatives from public postsecondary institutions and career centers. Members will be identified through a nominations process facilitated by the Office of the Board of Governors, the Division of Florida Colleges, and the Division of Career and Adult Education. Membership preference will be given to faculty members who have been involved in equivalency determinations for their discipline. When possible, a minimum of two representatives from each sector must have prior experience working as practitioners in the law enforcement field. Discipline committee members will serve a term of two years with the option to renew their membership at the end of the second year. The Subject Area Discipline Committee shall be made up of 12 representatives*:

However, there is nothing hibiting other trainings and courses, such as those related to basic ning, corrections officer training, and others, from being considered for re college credit/clock hour equivalencies. ACC will establish a statewide discipline committee for Criminal Justice Law Enforcement Training composed of representatives from public tsecondary institutions and career centers. Members will be identified ough a nominations process facilitated by the Office of the Board of ernors, the Division of Florida Colleges, and the Division of Career and It Education.
