


## Textbook Costs and

Their Impacts

Students are spending less on textbooks, but costs are still a substantial problem.

 The number of students spending \$300 or less rose.




Note: 2012 and 2016 had an option for "other" so do not total to 100%



# The Impact of Textbook Costs for Students

A significant percentage of students continues to be adversely impacted by high textbook costs

- There is some improvement over previous years
- Progress towards degree completion can be adversely impacted



## How Are Students Reducing Textbook Costs?

Students are using more digital products:

Just over half (50.5%) of respondents are renting digital textbooks, up compared to last two surveys.

## How Are Students Reducing Textbook Costs?

82% would like the option to purchase a low-cost paper copy of their textbook

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### Strategies that went **down** compared to the last two surveys:

- Buying books from a source other than the campus bookstore.
- Buying used copies from the campus bookstore
- Renting printed books
- Selling used books
- Sharing books with classmates



#### **Efforts to Reduce Costs**

#### **Inclusive Access Programs**

• 45.7% of all SUS students were not sure if such a program existed at their institution.

 59.7% of those participating did not feel it reduced their overall textbook costs.

#### **Open Educational Resources**

- The use of OERs is making progress, but there is more that can be done.
- 44.4% **did** have at least one or more course(s) that provided OER textbooks or instructional materials to them at no cost.
