This month, the University of Florida received the highest score of all the 11 public universities in Florida in the performance-funding model created by the Board of Governors. That means UF will receive an additional \$7.4 million in performance funding this year versus last year, bringing the total allotted to the university since 2014 to more than \$103 million.

I would like to offer thanks to the governor, the Legislature and the Board of Governors for their continued commitment and support for this program and for UF. The money will be used in UF's ongoing efforts to hire and retain the world's best and brightest faculty.

UF's high score was due in part to increasing its number of licenses and options executed on technologies developed at the university.
